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SOCIALIST LECTURE AT THE FALLS OTHER INTERESTING NEWS ITEMS

A lecture on Socialism was given by Rev. Ben. F. Wilson, in Dickson's Hall on Monday evening, Civic Holiday. His subject was "The Meaning and Significance of the Socialistic Movement." Mr. Wilson, who is a Canadian by birth, spent six years in the Methodist Ministry and has been travelling between Chicago and San Francisco for the last ten years. A year and a half ago he went to England, and devoted his entire time to speaking in England, Scotland Ireland and Wales. Mr. Wilson, who is a splendid orator, said that it was not his usual custom to give only one lecture in a town on this important subject, but as he had lectured last week in Lindsay and had one evening at his disposal he was induced to give a lecture here on the principles of Socialism. He spoke of the erroneous ideas possessed by many people of the meaning of Socialism and gave a masterful address, at the close of which he invited anyone who wished to contradict any of his statements, or to ask any questions concerning the movement to do so. The attendance was not as large as the importance of the subject and the reputation of the lecturer merited, but all who heard Mr. Wilson will not forget his eloquent and powerful exposition of the significance of the Socialistic movement.
