## STURGEON POINT REGATTA ON MONDAY DIFFERENT EVENTS KEENLY CONTESTED

The Civic Holiday regatta at Sturgeon Point turned out an unqualified success. There were large numbers of people in attendance from Lindsay, and nearby summer resorts. Automobiles, motor launches and boats of every description were everywhere. But there were no entries from Stony Lake or Chemong since the Stony Lake regatta was also held Monday. A little stiffer breeze would have satisfied the sailors more.

A great deal of interest centred around the open power boat race as the boats are yearly becoming faster.

There are several new launches on the water this year, and up to Monday, had never raced before, and speculation was rife as to which should prove the champion

The race was a very pretty one over an eight mile course. Dr. Caven's "Nahma" lead apparently very easily beating its nearest competitor by nearly two minutes. The time was 31 minutes and 25 seconds. Mr. G. H. Hopkins "Viking II" driven by Major F. Holmes Hopkins, pulled down second honors very neatly in 33 minutes and seven seconds. It was a very pretty finish between "Viking II" and Geo. Irwin's "Vim" which came in only 23 seconds later. At the start it looked as if "Vim" stood a very good chance of claiming the championship but as the outfit was perfectly new and had not been thoroughly adjusted owing to having been launched only forty-eight hours previous to the race she gradually lost place. Jesse Perrin's "Thief" and W. Flavelle's "Swallow" followed closely at 36 minutes, and 36 minutes and 36 seconds respectively.

The motor boat races were divided into four classes—Classes A & B for semi-speed boats, Class D for Family launches (12 h. p. and under). The boats in these three classes were sent over the course in the morning to make a speed record. Any boat exceeding this speed in the afternoon by 5 per cent would be disqualified. "Wa-Wa" was scratch boat in class A—"Roy III" and "Eala" were scratch boats in class B—Mr. Grace's "Ma-veen" in class D.

In class A motor boats of two to 6 horsepower, the winner was W. M. Goodwin's "Wa-Wa" with J. P. Ryley's launch second. Other entries were, S. Magill, W. Ferguson, and T. Stewart. In this race Mr. W. Goodwin's launch "Wa-Wa" started last, and finished first, showing the extra good speed qualities of this little craft.

The winner of class B, seven to twelve horsepower was Clerk's "Sweetheart" with F. W. Sutcliffe's "Bonka" second. Other entries were A. Gillies "Eala" G. H. Wilson's Roy III and J. C. Grace's "Ma-veen."

Class D—family launches, over five feet five inches beam and under 12 hp. was captured by R. J. McLaughlin's launch with F. W. Sutcliffe's "Bonka" a close second.

## LOCAL OPTION AND HOTEL VALUES

Woodville Advocate: There is evidently considerable difference of opinion as to the effect of local option on the various hotel properties in Beaverton, as was brought out in the Court of Revision of the village assessment roll held by His Honor Judge McIntyre last week. The Council, it appears, declined to reduce the assessor's award—made earlier in the season, by anything like what the owners of the properties claimed the depreciation caused by the loss of their licenses to have been hence the appeal to the judge. The assessment of the "Hamilton House," by the assessor was \$6,854.34, including business tax of \$634, while that of the Overend property was \$4,658.67, including a business tax of \$358.67. A number of witnesses were heard as to present values, among those being Mr. Dixon Jewett, of Cannington, Mr. Hector Campbell, late of Kirkfield, Mr. A. W. Hamilton, of Sunderland, and Mr. Fred Beck, of Cannington, all of whom placed the depreciation at varying figures from 50 to 75 per cent. In rebuttal the Reeve and Councillor Berchard maintained that the properties had never been assessed at their legitimate value and were much below their selling values at the assessor's valuation. In the case of the Overend property, it being pointed out that the proprietor, even after local option had come into force, placed its value at \$8000 while Mr. Ernest R. Gunn offered the court to lease the sheds only at a rental of 7 per cent of the assessor's valuation. The Court, however, seemed to think some reduction should be made but reserved decision.

## JUNIOR MATRICULATION RESULTS

The results of the junior matriculation examinations were announced yesterday by the Department of Education. The department issued the following statement:—

The list contains the names of all candidates who have obtained complete junior matriculation by passing on the eleven required examination papers, which are as follows:—English composition, English literature, history, algebra, geometry, Latin authors, Latin composition, together with four papers in two of the following subjects:—Experimental science, (physics and chemistry), French, (authors and composition), German, (authors and composition), Greek, (authors and composition).

In group B are given the names of those who have passed in at least eight of the papers required for complete matriculation, and have obtained the minimum required on the whole examination. They have, therefore failed in not more than three of the required papers. The papers in which these candidates have failed, will be shown on their certificates. They may complete matriculation by passing in all the remaining papers at one subsequent examination. In this list will be found the names of successful candidates who have passed on the complete matriculation, and who have passed on all papers upon which they have written, but who have not obtained partial matriculation as in the case of those in group B. In this list will be found the names of successful candidates who have written only on those papers required for matriculation into the Ontario College of Pharmacy.

Normal entrance candidates who were also candidates for matriculation, have been considered in the above results. The names of such candidates, if successful in obtaining complete matriculation are included in group A, and if partial in group B.

The certificates of successful candidates, and the statements of marks of those who failed will be sent to the Principals of the high schools and collegiate institutes or to the public school inspectors in a few days. Candidates will apply to these officials, not to the Department, for the reports in detail.
