### MAY PUT CONVICTS **BUILDING ROADS**

The Ottawa Free Press says: The visit of Hon. C. J. Doherty to Britain and France may mean the setting to work of some seventeen hundred convicts in the Canadian penitentiaries on various construction and road making tests for the Dominion of Canada.

The minister of justice expressed, before leaving Canada, his intention of learning in Britain and France by personal visits the latest methods of handling convicts and of making them of use to the state. While Britain it is known that Mr. Doherty visited Dartmoor, Reading and Holloway and other famous British prisons.
