OF INTEREST TO STALLION OWNERS

THE ONTARIO STALLION ACT The Lieutenant-Governor in Council upon the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture shall appoint four persons, who, with the director of the live stock branch of the Department of Agriculture, shall constitute the Stallion Enrolment Board hereinafter called the Board.

Inspectors. The Minister of Agriculture may from time to time appoint competent persons to act as inspectors under the direction of the Board and every inspection shall be made by a Committee, hereinafter called "The Committee," consisting of three such persons.

(1) No person shall stand, travel or offer for use any stallion unless and until the name has been enrolled and a certificate of such enrolment | August 11, 12, 13, 14, round trip procured as hereinafter provided.

(2) For the purpose of enrelment the owner of every stallion shall sub mit to the Board all evidence of the breeding and ownership of such stal lion and upon receipt of same and payment of the fee, the Board shall issue a certificate accordingly.

(3) All certificates of enrolment shall be renewed annually in acmor could not be confirmed at the upon the payment of the fee hereinafter provided.

(4) In addition, if desired by the owner, any stallion may be inspected as herein provided, in which case the report of such inspection shall form a part of the record of enrolment.

STAMPS ISSUED IN FORM OF ROLLS

Word was received yesterday the Canadian Manufacturers' Association that the Post Office Department has agreed to issue stamps in one and two cent denominations in the form of rolls as well as in sheet form. There will be five hundred in a roll, and an extra charge of six cents per roll will be made to cover the cost of manufacture.

This will prove a great boom to industrial firms both as regards the saving of time and the prevention of pilfering. The action of the Department is due to repeated representations made by the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. The new rolls will be available about the first of September.-Globe.

GOVERNMENT TO TAKE UNCLAIMED MONEYS

(Special to The Post.)

Ottawa, July 7-A report issued by the Finance Department shows claimed balances in the banks amounting to \$676,147; unpaid dividends totalling \$3,659, and unpaid drafts on bills of exchange for \$49,857 at close of the fiscal year.

Unclaimed balances show an crease of \$38,000 over last year and unpaid drafts, etc. \$10,000. These balances under present condi-

tions revert to the banks, but it is understood that legislation will be introduced through the new Bank Act by which they will revert to the people through the Government.
