MATRICULATION RESULTS ARE DELAYED

The junior and senior matriculation results are not expected out until towards the end of next week. This statement was given out by the Education Department today, and at the same time the reason for the unusual delay was made known. In the past 100 marks have been awarded on each paper, but this year the Universities have succeeded in having the value of the papers changed. On some subjects 150 marks are given, 100 on others, and 75 on still others. This has caused an endless amount of work in the marking of the papers and figuring out the percentages of the candidates.

Anxious students throughout the Province, however, may rest assured that every effort is being made to get the results tabulated. "We are working night and day at them" said an official of the department. It was also stated that there is no re-reading of matriculation examination papers, so there will be no delay from that source.

Montreal Grain and Produce.
MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—Apart from oats the export trade in grain continues very slow. There was a fair amount of enquiry for Manitoba spring wheat to-day, but the market was the same of a few days ago, and foreign buyers showed no disposition to close up the ground between their bids and the prices local exporters are asking. The trade at the moment has taken on a waiting air, buyers quite evidently being unwilling to increase their commitments, while the trend of the Winnipeg market remains uncertain. On the other hand there was another big demand for oats during the day and a good business was reported.

Very little is doing in the flour trade either for foreign or district account, crop, and the elements of uncertainty remaining in the western situation in the meantime restrict the volume of business in flour.

Union Stock Yards.
TORONTO, Aug. 12.—Receipts of five stock at the Union Yards were 152 cars, comprising 2987 cattle, 330 hogs, 464 sheep, 72 calves and 18 horses.

Exporters.
The only buyers of export cattle reported were Swift & Co., who bought 150 steers, heifers and cows as follows: Steers, \$7 to \$7.40; heifers, \$6.75 to \$7; export cows, \$5.50 to \$5.75. It will be seen that the highest price was \$7.40, as compared with \$7.60 of last week, and only a small proportion of cattle bought in comparison with the prices of last week.

Montreal Live Stock.
MONTREAL, Aug. 12.—The receipts of live stock at the west end market for the week ended Aug. 10, were 10,800 cattle, 450 calves, 1800 sheep and lambs, and 1600 hogs. The offerings to-day were 1300 head of cattle, 200 calves, 1600 sheep and lambs and 600 hogs.

The market for the whole was only fair, especially for cattle. Choice steers were comparatively scarce and while prices for these were firm around \$7 per 100 pounds, the prices for good butchers steers were easy at \$6.25 to \$6.50; fair ranged \$5.90 to \$6.15, and medium, \$5.60 to \$5.80 per 100 pounds. Butcher's cows, which were at \$4.50 per 100 pounds down to \$3. There was little demand for bulls and prices were weak at \$3 to \$3.50 per 100 pounds.
