MINDEN VILLAGE IS KNOCKING AT GATES OF THE TRENT VALLEY CANAL

Examiner: Minden, now in a state of splendid isolation, is determined to be annexed to the Trent Canal system, with all the advantages such connection would involve. The people of that place are agitating the question of petitioning the government to take steps to navigably connect Minden and the vast untrodden expanse of mingled lakes and forest that stretch northward with the Trent Canal. The Dominion Government is building a dam at Moore's Falls, on the Gull River waters about midway between Cobocok and Minden, and the latter, as well as the whole vicinity, is anxious that at the same time a lock be placed at this point, as a unit in the system of locks necessary to connect the Gull River waters with the Canal system. It appears that this would only be a beginning of an enterprise that would be well worth while, both from a tourist and industrial point of view. The connection proposed would open to the world the finest fishing waters in Canada, well stocked with living schools of game and fish, including the salmon trout, and would bring into commercial accessibility vast stretches of virgin hardwood forest, and, possibly, mineral wealth.

It is urged by those favoring this enterprise that there is now navigable water from Minden to the head of Gull Lake—four miles—sufficient to

accommodate any steamer plying on Trent Valley waters. From the head of Gull Lake to Moore's Falls—eight miles—the average depth of water is one hundred feet. It is felt that if a lock were put in at Moore's Falls, where the government dam is now in process of erection, a big step would be made in connecting these waters with the Trent Canal system, and extending the stretch of navigable waters very considerably and very profitably, and in a way to add to the importance of the Canal, and confer important direct advantages upon the district, and equally important indirect advantages upon the country at large. The people of Minden and vicinity feel that they are warranted in urging the connection proposed upon the practical attention of the government and the public may soon hear of steps being taken to endeavor to enlist government action.

MR. HOPKINS ON WRECKED TRAIN

Mr. J. Hopkins, Cambridge-st. was a passenger on the Winnipeg-Toronto C.P.R. express, which left the rails near Cartier, one hundred miles west of North Bay on Saturday morning. His family received a telegram on Sunday which stated that he escaped unhurt.

It was during the absence of the occupants of the house, and the light fingered individual evidently entered

by way of the cellar. He carried off a consignment of preserves and after making a general inspection of the residence, visited the doctor's bedroom, and purloined his best overcoat.

Nothing else has been missed to date, and there is no clue to the perpetrator of the theft.

OFFICE OPENED IN FEW DAYS FOR NATIONAL BOLT LOCK NUT INDUSTRY

As was announced in the Post on Saturday, Mr. T. L. Stark, of the National Bolt Lock Nut and Drop Forging Co., Limited, paid a short visit to Lindsay, combining business with pleasure.

Since his departure from Lindsay some weeks ago Mr. Stark has had the bolt lock nut tested by several large manufacturing concerns, and they one and all declared it a splendid success.

A demonstration was held at the Canadian branch of the great Westinghouse firm, and the officials were unanimous in declaring the invention

entirely satisfactory, and the most complete bolt lock nut ever turned out.

Mr. Stark feels that he has in the drop nut an article for which there will be a great demand, and he feels flattered as a result of the tests made by the concerns referred to.

In conversation with the Post Mr. Stark said that together with the bolt works, Lindsay would probably see a rolling mills started here in the near future.

Mr. Stark expects to return to Lindsay in a few days to open up offices in connection with his bolt lock nut industry.

SAFE BLOWN OPEN AT PETERBORO VERY LITTLE BOOTY WAS SECURED

Examiner: Safe crackers entered the office building of the G. Walter Green Co., Limited Friday night and blew open the company's safe. About \$30 in cash and \$4 worth of stamps are missing. The latter were taken from the cash drawer of a desk which stood in the office. The burglars left no clue, and nothing but a badly shattered safe and a partially wrecked room in which the safe stood, greeted Mr. T. O. Donaldson, secretary-treasurer of the company, when he entered the building this morning.

That the work was that of an experienced cracksmen was apparent by the thorough manner in which it was done.

EXPLOSION WAS SEVERE

Mr. T. O. Donaldson, in conversation with the Examiner, stated that he believed that the handle of the safe had first been removed and a charge of explosive substance was placed in the hole that was caused by the forcible removal of the handle. The door was completely blown off its hinges and was otherwise badly wrecked. The cash drawer with some \$30 in cash was missing and a number of books that were in the safe were badly mutilated as a result of the explosion. The charge struck a wall at the side of the safe and tore a large hole in the plaster, in addition to doing other extensive damage to the room.

The exact time of the robbery is not known, but it is believed to have been about 12 o'clock at night, as about that time a couple of residents

in the vicinity claimed to have heard an explosion.

BOOTY WAS SMALL

It is believed that the cracksmen entered the building by a small window on the east side of the office, and made their exit from the front door, the lock of which had been removed by the aid of a screw driver. Other windows in the building were also open when the secretary of the company entered the office this morning. The cash drawer in the office was also ransacked and a quantity of stamps removed.

It is surmised that the burglars selected Friday night for their operations believing that the safe would contain a large sum of money that would be used in the payment of the men employed at the works.

NOTES WERE UNTOUCHED

Mr. G. W. Green was out of town last night, and the first to enter the building this morning was Mr. T. O. Donaldson.

The matter has been placed in the hands of the police.

A number of notes and other papers of value that were contained in the safe were untouched.

"OIL EXPERTS" BEING SOUGHT

At the request of the provincial authorities the police are looking for two men, said to pose as "oil experts," who are alleged to be defrauding farmers in Halton and Wentworth counties and the surrounding district. Inspector Campbell said today he had furnished his men with a description of the strangers and close watch is being kept for them. In the meantime farmers are requested to communicate with the authorities if they get any trace of the pair.

The alleged "oil experts" were said to have devised a modern method of operating the old lightning-rod fraud. These geniuses represent themselves as oil speculators and seek agreements with the farmers for the purchase of their property, offering there for prices sufficiently large to be tempting. An arrangement for the sale of the farm is closed and the inevitable agreement produced. This the farmer is asked to sign.

When the document is duly signed a portion of it is cut away leaving the signature attached to a promissory note. In some cases the amount of this note is large, one instance which has come to the attention of the police being for \$2,500. The fraud was discovered by a visitor, who warned a Halton farmer what was happening, and the two "oil speculators" jumped hurriedly into their waiting rig and drove away.

The two men concerning whom the provincial superintendent is anxious to cultivate professional acquaintance are both comparatively young. One is described as 5 feet, 8 inches high, 135 pounds in weight, clean shaven, with dark hair and complexion, wearing a blue serge sack suit and tan shoes, and carrying a light colored raincoat. His mate is also clean shaven, and has prominent ears standing almost straight out from the head. He is fair, and wears a blue suit, with a white waistcoat, Panama hat and raincoat.

ACT RESPECTING MONEY LENDERS

Enquiries have been made at the office for fuller information regarding the notice in a recent issue regarding the new act on money-lenders. Small lenders are under the impression that the act covers their business and that they must take out a license before advancing a loan, matter how small the amount. It is not the case, as the following notice from the act will explain. Any lender shall mean a person who carries on that business in connection with any business, whether the money lent is his own or that of any other person, or who advertises or holds himself out, or who gives any notice or sign indicating that he is a money lender."

RUN MID-DAY TRAIN TO HALIBURTON

The Bobcaygeon Independent Haliburton correspondent says: Is it not time that another effort was made to have the mid day train that runs to Kilmount continued here. Fenelon Falls has two regular trains and a special evening train, Kilmount has two regular trains daily, and gets its mail mid-day. Minden and Haliburton gets its mail by old time between seven at night and the next day. Gelert, Lochlin, Goulds, are all stations to summer resorts, an hour or so drive away, and a service that makes these people leave Toronto at eight in the morning and delivers them at their resort at eight at night, and gets them at four in the morning when returning home, is not going to develop traffic very rapidly. If the Coy. waits for traffic to develop under such conditions it will wait till dooms day. Surely that Kilmount train can be brought here during the summer months only a matter of two hours at most for the return trip, and if this cannot be done every day, why not at least two days a week, Wednesdays and Saturdays. The Post Office Department might do something to get a better mail service.
