### Montreal Grain and Produce.

MONTREAL, Aug. 21.—Cables on Manitoba spring wheat were unchanged to 1/4c lower. The demand continues fairly good for both old and new crop, but the volume of business doing is small, as exporters state the strike at Fort William is delaying the boats from being loaded, and if it continues for any length of time it will be very serious. Oats are strong and prices have scored another advance of 1/4c per bushel with sales of 30,000 extra No. 1 feed at 47c ex-store and sales of 30,000 were made over the cable and if it were not for the scarcity of shippers on spot considerable more would have been sold. There was a fair demand from foreign buyers for new crop spring wheat flour for October shipment and sales of 10,000 sacks were made and bids for 25c were recorded for winter wheat grades for prompt shipment. The local trade is fair and prices steady. Bran and shorts active. Butter quiet and easy on account of no demand from the west. Cheese firmer under fair demand. Eggs steady. Provisions fairly active.
