DRIVE OUT ANIMALS

In the townships of Digby, Long-Welsh, of Norwood, whose Anson, it is simply impossible estimate the section of country that is swept by fire. So extensive is that deer, beaver, skunks and wolves have been driven before flames into sections where they are seldom seen, and a few days ago an unusually large wolf was shot Anson township. A large part this country is but sparsely settled and in several of the townships wide beaver meadows and hardwood brush provided the driest of tinder for the fires. Added to this is the hardwood brush and the trimmings from the wood that has been cut. This is the driest of fuel and invites the flames to do their worst. At Donald this morning a black-
