(To the Editon of The Post) It gives me pleasure to comply with your request to give my receipts for the control of the aphides (plant louse- and the oyster shell bark

The first of these is a little soft, green mite of a bug that attacks the terder green shoots and leaves of fruit trees, grapes and house plants Most persons having house plants know them and use tobacco tea to de-

stroy them. My attention was drawn to apple and pear trees and grape vines that nearly all the leaves were curled from the attack of these little mites by the thousands that were sucking the life out of them. Repeated attacks will kill the trees. A remedy for this is to spray the leaves from the under side with a spray made as follows; Two pounds of refuse or stems of tobacco, Five gallons soft water, boiled thoroughly for half an hour or longer to get a strong decotion of tobacco. To this add 1-4 pound hard soap, sliced thin, continue to boil until thoroughly dissolved.

Picking Plums The exact time for picking plums can be determined only be experience. It will depend on the distance from the market and the shipping qualities 130 of the variety. Plums will bear pick-(10) ing when quite green, particularly 60 the Japanese varieties. When intend-145 ed for a nearby market they may be left on the tree as long as possible. Most of the Japanese varieties, and some others ripen very nicely after picking. They can be kept for three or four weeks in a fairly cool tlark place, and come out in good condition. Sometimes they can be kept much longer. As some of the American varieties are apt to break their skins when ripe, care should be taken to pick them on the green side.




