The Markham Economist says that the Toronto and York Radial Railway Company are said to be prepared with a well defined proposition to extend their line from Yonge street to Markham, and on to Locust Hill and Greenwood, eventually reaching Port Perry.

An alternate route to reach Markham village is said to be via the Kingston road route, branching off somewhere about the Markham road and so on to Markham village.

The first named project is without doubt the better one from all standpoints, as the road would pass through a thickly populated, rich agricultural section, dotted with thriving little villages, most of which are now from two to eight miles distant from a railway station. Such a road would pay from the start in freight traffic alone.

The company have already made a survey via Yonge street, diverging near Langstalf to Markham village, through private right of way and the grade is very light. To Port Perry, the cost of construction would also be light, except at the crossing of the east branch at the Rouge at Locust Hill, where a long trestle might have to be built.
