## Trolley Cars are Coming Near

Already Planned to Reach the Village of Port Perry.

It may not be long before the trolley car reaches Lindsay, if we may judge by the rapidity with which it is being extended eastward from Toronto.

The Markham Economist says that the Toronto and York Radial Railway Company are said to be prepared with a well defined proposition to extend their line from Yonge street to Markham, and on to Locust Hill and Greenwood, eventually reaching Port Perry.

An alternate route to reach Markham village is said to be via the Kingston road route, branching off somewhere about the Markham road and so on to Markham village.

The first named project is without doubt the better one from all standpoints, as the road would pass through a thickly populated, rich agricultural section, dotted with thriving little villages, most of which are now from two to eight miles distant from a railway station. Such a road would pay from the start in freight traffic alone.

The company have already made a survey via Yonge street, diverging near Langstaff to Markham village, through private right of way and the grade is very light. To Port Perry, the cost of construction would also be light, except at the crossing of the east branch at the Rouge at Locust Hill, where a long trestle might have to be built.

### Trip to Port on the Scugog

Engineer Grant Takes a Trip Up the River on a voege of Discovery

A special tour of investigation with a view to personal knowledge of the condition of Lake Scugog and its tributaries was made last week by the engineer of the Trent Valley Canal, Mr. Grant, who was accompanied by Assistant Engineer Davy. The trip was made in the launch Roy II, and Mr. Geo. H. Wilson and Mr. Roy Wilson joined the party.

At Cross Creeks Mr. Nicholas Davy was taken on board, who called attention to the many acres of valuable land which is covered with water for several weeks in the spring, spring to the flash boards being placed on the dam when the water should be allowed to escape until it reaches the normal level.

Passing up the river it was quite difficult to navigate the launch owing to the weeds, which in many places had invaded the very bed of the river, and when Scugog Lake was reached the weeds were worse than in the river, as almost the entire lake is filled with a growth of a species of weeds which grows to the depth of several feet, but does not appear on the surface of the water, and it means disaster if any launch has the misfortune to get into one of these numerous beds, as progress is impossible.

The lake can, however, be navigated by one acquainted with the channels, but as they are not buoyed it is a simple matter.

The progress of the Roy on the Scugog was not very rapid under the circumstances, and it was almost 4 p.m. when Port Perry was seen in the distance, and after many encounters with the weeds on the west side of Scugog Island, the launch was finally tied up at the town wharf.
