Fires are Raging In the North

Fire Invaded Graphite Mine Property and Exploded Dynamite

Mr. William O'Brien, of Peterboro, traveller for the Imperial Tobacco Co. arrived in town Friday morning from the north country, which he says is all ablaze from forest fires. He was in Kinmount Thursday and reports that a fierce fire is raging about half a mile from the exhibition grounds.

In Wilberforce on the 9th inst, Mr O'Brien states that fires were raging on all sides and penetrated the property of Matthews & Cummings, graphite miners. The flames ignited the sheds in which the dynamite was stored and the explosion which followed entirely wrecked the plant and the surrounding buildings.

The fire in the vicinity of the village of Bancroft is assuming such proportions that the settlers are fighting it day and night, and on Wednesday the village fire brigade and engine fought the fire which threatened to sweep the place.

Fire at the Falls Was Extinguished

Storehouse Caught Fire But Very Little Damage was Done

An alarm of fire was sounded about half-past four o'clock last Friday morning. It was found that the storehouse used for storing acetate of lime and belonging to the Chemical Company, was on fire.

The firemen and hose were quickly on the spot, but the prompt action of the watchman and first comers together with plenty of water from Cameron Lake, which is close to hand, had extinguished the flames when they arrived.

Quite a crowd of people turned out who were glad to find that the fire was under control. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed that it was caused by a spark from a passing engine.

On Thursday Mr. Edwin Wood, aged 74 years, who has been a sufferer for some length of time, was removed to the Ross hospital, Lindsay. His many friends here hope for his recovery.

The Post has arranged to conduct a branch of the International Newspaper Study Club. The questions will appear in this department every week, and all are invited to write out their answers and send them in to this office. Any information regarding the contest will also be gladly given at any time by those who ask for it. It costs nothing to join and the prizes are well worth the winning.

Persons may join the club at any time during the year, but must of course answer the 52 questions to qualify for the prizes. It is, however, desirable that the questions be answered as the lessons are studied. This club is for the purpose of promoting in an unfettered way among the masses, a wider study of the Bible and the biblical truths of Christianity. It is composed of all those who join a local club, and take up this month's course herein outlined, barring only ordained clergymen. We have the systematic cooperation of the latter, but it is not considered fair to have them compete for the prizes. Sunday school teachers, Bible class scholars, and church goers generally, belonging to this Newspaper Club, also non-church goers of all shades of opinion, all such who have not joined are warmly invited to do so, and to compete for the prizes.

CONDITIONS OF THE CONTEST.
1. Each contestant, or his or her family must be a subscriber to this paper during the continuance of the contest in order to qualify for membership in this Local Club.
2. Each contestant in this Local Club must answer each of the written questions for 52 consecutive weeks, commencing Saturday, Aug. 22, 1908, and the answers must all be in the possession of this paper by August 30, 1909, which allows two weeks grace after the close of the contest.
3. Each question must be answered separately, and the paper written on one side only. No answer must exceed 200 words in length and may be less. It will be a convenience if students will write their answer on separate paper, size about 8 1-2 inches by 14 inches.
4. Each answer must have the name and address of the writer at the bottom of each answer so it can be identified, giving a number, registered, and then the name cut off so the examiner can know it by the number only.
5. Students should be careful to understand the question before answering. To do this the lesson text must be read and especially the verse or verses upon which the question is based.
6. The question from the Local Club must be delivered to this office and they will be collated at the end of the contest and forwarded to the head quarters of the International Newspaper Bible Study Club for independent examination by competent examiners. The prizes will then be awarded according to the highest number of marks, and those won by members of this local club will be given out from this office.

THE PRIZES.
First series—A gold medal to each of the first five contestants.
Second series—A silver medal to each of the next five contestants.
Third series—A teacher's Bible, price \$5.50, to each of the next five contestants.
Fourth series—The book, "The Heart of Christianity," price \$1.50, to each of the next thirty-five contestants.
