Why ducks are protected until the 15th of September, and snipe, plover, shore birds and waders are allowed to be shot on the 1st of that month is strange indeed. When shooting at snipe or plover the ducks are sure to be disturbed, and driven from their feeding grounds. Common horse sense should at least be applied in such matters.
