Chinese Get Back at Keough

Windsor, Sept. 14.—Incensed because Ald. Keough has suggested that a license fee of \$50 be placed on their establishments, several Chinese laundry proprietors are said to have banded together for protection, and, incidentally, to rebuke Keough for such a thought.

The Chinamen have about completed negotiations for a long lease on the old Charter homestead, in the same block in which is located Ald. Keough's fine residence. It is understood they will convert the house into a big laundry establishment, in spite of any protests residents in the neighborhood may make. Catholic Prelates Are Leaving

(Special to The Post) Montreal, Sept. 14.—Cardinal Gibbons, who was the guest of Sir Thomas Shaughnessy during the congress, left yesterday morning for New York, en route for Baltimore, and Cardinal Logue will follow in a few days. Archbishop Bourne will leave for Portland today, en route for New York, and daily both American and European prelates and priests are leaving the city.

Archbishop Bourne stated yesterday that he had never seen such an orderly crowd in his life as that of Sunday. London itself, offering few demonstrations similar in magnitude to that of the closing day of the great congress.

Yesterday morning, His Grace of Westminster had a long interview with Henri Bourassa, M.P.P., who had taken exception to the English prelate's statement that if the west is to be brought into the Catholic fold it must be done by means of the English tongue. After the interview His grace told the press that all misunderstanding had been overcome.

Best Start in Life for Boys

"What is the best start in life parents can give their boy?"

This question presents itself these strenuous days with anxious force to all those who have the welfare of their children at heart. And it is of vital importance, this start, for the first six years of a man's life makes him.

A boy's start in life is therefore, largely influenced by his very earliest impressions. More important than anything money can buy are the influences of home. Let these be the purest and best. Let the boy take with him into the world the memory of a mother's unfailing, gentle sympathy, and the confidence that he has in his father an adviser to whom he can appeal in any difficulty or trouble, that must inevitably arise.

And we must not forget the physical start parents can give a boy. A boy, strong and healthy in mind as well as in body—"a sound mind in a sound body"—is facing towards success. For in all departments of life, there is required strenuous work, either manual or mental. If a boy is born delicate it lies with the parents to transform his weakness into strength. He needs an abundance of fresh air, simple, wholesome food, plenty of exercise, plenty of sleep, and not too much attention or too much coddling.

In considering the questions "What shall the boy be?" and "How shall he be best prepared to compete with his fellows and make a way for himself in life?" parents should study their son's characteristics and tendencies, and watch in which direction his inclinations lie. Some children show a marked preference at a very early stage of their existence for

some particular interest or occupation. When this is the case matters are simplified. Let those tastes be cultivated and guided.

It is useless, and generally disastrous, to require a boy to follow his father's profession or business, whether he shows any aptitude for succeeding in it or not.

Train the boy to be a hard worker in everything; he puts his hand to, to act all his life on the principle of righteousness, and justice, to be broadminded and tolerant, and he will achieve "success" in every sense of the word.—A. Chittick.
