## At the General Conference Session

Rev. J. P. Wilson Referred to His Trip to West on Sunday

The Rev. J. P. Wilson at the Cambridge street Methodist church gave a short sermon of his trip to the general conference held at Victoria, B. C. He said the advancement and improvements that met his eye, after an intermission of several years since his previous visit, were very marked and remarkable. Places along the line of railway that were only hamlets of a half dozen houses were now in many cases large progressive towns and cities. After a long and somewhat monotonous railway ride it was most refreshing to reach Winnipeg and see its fine streets, trees, and fine buildings and population of 130,000 and to realize that Winnipeg is the greatest grain market in the world. To think that thirty-five years ago that country had not a railway in its borders, and today the whole west is a net work of railways and its lands then only sparsely settled, was now populated with a vast people whose progressive natures were destined to make the West one of the most important food growing countries on the globe. Of the many fine towns on the main line, Calgary is next in importance, and is certainly a fine city with a population of forty thousand, and the city owns its own electric plant, water works, telephone, street railway, and other franchises, and were making a success in their management. Victoria, B. C., was beautiful, historic, and has many points to commend it to the traveller, but his preference had been Vancouver, with its magnificent harbor, which could accommodate the largest fleets of the world. Its splendid buildings and general progressive air is wonderful, when one remembers that in 1886 the whole city was burned to the ground with the exception of one house. It has beautiful characteristically public buildings and infects one with an air of speculation which is hard to resist. This city had a broad outlook and a very promising future.

The blaze started in the upper story, and as a stiff wind was blowing, at the time, the situation was quite serious. A bucket brigade was organized by the men of the village, and the manner in which they fought the fire is deserving of all praise. Through their brave efforts practically all of the household effects were saved, although the upper portion of the building was badly gutted.

Every owner of a dray set to work after the blaze was extinguished and drew the contents saved to the old Royal hotel, where Mr. McCrae will cater to the public until the Queen's hotel is improved.

The building and contents were covered by insurance.

The deceased, who has been a sufferer for nearly a year, was born in Whitby. He has been a faithful employee of the G.T.R. for twenty-five years, starting as a wiper. He was confined in the Ross Memorial Hospital for about a fortnight, and was a great sufferer.

The deceased is survived by a sorrowing wife, two children, a boy and a girl, a sister, Mrs. Wm. Chambers, Lindsay, and a brother, William, a G.T.R. engineer of Sutton, Ont. The late Mr. Dolby was a member of the S.O.E.B.S., the Home Circle and Brotherhood of Railway Engineers.

The funeral will take place Tuesday afternoon under S.O.E.B.S. auspices to the Riverside cemetery.

## C.N.R. Hotel For Winnipeg

Winnipeg, Sept. 17.—The Canadian Northern Railway will begin shortly to build the proposed hotel in Winnipeg to cost \$2,000,000.
