WHITNEY AT SEAFORTH.

Mr James is Drawing Card at J. J. Merner's Meeting.

Seaforth, Sept. 14.—Sir James Whitney was given an enthusiastic reception last night in his appearance in South Huron in the interest of the Liberal-Conservative candidate, J. J. Merner. Over 2,000 people of both political parties crowded the skating and curling rink from the town and surrounding country.

The Premier's speech was intensely imperial and vigorously condemnatory of the Fielding-Paterson-Taft agreement. F. Holmstead of Seaforth was the chairman.

Before Sir James Whitney spoke he was presented with an address by Mayor McCallum and with a bouquet of flowers by Miss Olive Rankin. Sir James, who spoke for more than one hour, was accorded an attentive hearing. He said the designs of the United States were not favorable to Canada, where they expected to reap the benefit and not the Canadians, and quoted President Taft to substantiate his arguments. He dealt with the prices of horses, cattle, sheep and swine, and quoted figures to show that the prices in Canada were higher than in the United States. He did not think that the farmers of this country would be hoodwinked into voting for something that would be a benefit to the farmers of the United States and against their own interest. He dealt with the hay and barley and claimed that the best market would be to use it on the farm where it was grown. He dealt with the railways of this country, showing where Canada had spent \$170,000,000 in building railways east and west, and that these roads would be practically useless east of Winnipeg if our trade was connected north and south. He closed his speech with an appeal to all loyal Canadians and lover of British government to vote against reciprocity on Sept. 21.

Borden in Dartmouth.

Halifax, Sept. 14.—Borden and Croby addressed a meeting last night in Dartmouth, across the harbor from Halifax. The leader received a warm reception, an overflow meeting being necessary to handle the crowd. The addresses were along the usual lines on the reciprocity pact. Sir Hibbert Tupper addressed a large meeting in Middleton, Annapolis County, last night. Mr. Borden addressed two meetings in Fielding's riding to-day.

Bourassa Sues For Libel.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—Henri Bourassa yesterday entered an action for \$10,000 damages against L. A. Rivet, Liberal candidate in Hochelaga, for alleged defamatory libel. The libel suit is the result of certain statements said to have been made by Mr. Rivet in the course of a campaign speech, Sept. 6, to the effect that Mr. Bourassa was being subsidized to the extent of \$200,000 by the Conservative and Orangemen of Ontario, this sum being supposedly devoted to the interests of Le Devoir, the official organ of French-Canadian nationalism.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Ontario architects are holding a convention at Ottawa.

It is reported that Gen. Cotton will succeed Gen. Otter as Inspector-General of the Canadian forces.

The sandusker Little was sunk in collision on Lake St. Clair, and the barge Winnipeg was sunk near Faran's Point.

The next triennial session of the General Anglican Synod will be held at Vancouver the second week in September, 1914.

E. F. B. Johnston will defend Mr. Jones, editor of Vankleek Hill, who is being prosecuted for criminal libel by Judge Constantineau.

Mrs. Hannah Wright of 1,081 Dovercourt road, Toronto, was struck and instantly killed by a westbound C.P.R. freight train yesterday.

Arthur Marshall, the four-year-old son of an Ancaster Township farmer, fell from the mow of his father's barn and died half an hour afterward.

Ten lives lost, 50 persons injured, and eight city squares, comprising 205 houses, razed was the havoc wrought at Corinto, Nicaragua, by a hurricane.

Henry Nemerutt, aged 70, of Fraserville, Ont., died in the Peterboro hospital yesterday from injuries received as the result of a kick by a spirited colt.

The Rev. Mr. Swann sculled a skiff across the English Channel from Dover to Calais in three hours and 50 minutes. This breaks the record for the performance.

Former Policeman Louis Steckley, dismissed from the Berlin force a couple of weeks ago, pleaded guilty to breaking into Longo Bros. fruit store and stealing \$68 and valuable papers from the safe.

N. Florio, an Italian, 21 years old, was killed yesterday afternoon at Talbot's plant in Sault Ste. Marie. He was struck by a rock from a blast and died immediately upon entry to the hospital.

LOOKING FOR UNION.

General Synod Favors Steps Toward Church Unity.

London, Ont., Sept. 14.—In general synod assembled the Church of England of the Dominion of Canada last night passed a resolution to seek union with other churches. The resolution was adopted after a long debate, which commenced in the afternoon session, occupied the greater part of that session and most of the evening. Rev. Principal Belford of the Montreal Diocesan College gave the following resolution, which passed unanimously:

"The general synod places on record its earnest desire for Christian union, and as an end thereto recommends the clergy and laity to avail themselves of every opportunity of Christian cooperation, which does not involve a sacrifice of church principles. And that the clergy seek opportunity to confer with their brethren of other unions concerning the principle of church union."

During the afternoon a message was received from the House of Bishops recommending that the synod pass a resolution that the delegates to the 1912 synod at Vancouver be assessed \$10 to help defray the contingent expenses. This carried, also that the delegates' allowances for meals while traveling be limited to \$2 per day.
