Sir Wilfrid Replies Seriously to the Manufacturers.

THEY MAY ROUSE COUNTRY

At Splendid Rally In Ottawa the Premier Answers the Statements of Local Magnates by Telling Them That Their Tactics May Awaken Such Resentment as to

Sweep Away the Tariff. Ottawa, Sept. 19.-Ottawa has tendered Sir Wilfrid Laurier many splendid receptions, both on personal and political grounds. Last night's greeting to the Prime Minister in its enthusiasm and record-breaking crowd exceeded all previous demonstrations. Dey's Arena, the largest auditorium in the city, was packed to overflowing with a crowd of fully ten thousand. The Conservative candidates caught the overflow, and a small opposition meeting was held in a neighboring

Giverin, the first speaker, was evidenced by the rousing and continued cheers which greeted his appearance. His election on Thursday next is conceded by the local Conservatives. He dealt vigorously with the flag-waving appeal of his opponents, noting that at the same hour Mr. Bourassa, the Empire-breaker, was speaking at Sudbury in open alliance with the Conservative candidate. Sir Wilfrid Laurier arrived late from Rockland, where he had been addressing a rally on behalf of the Secretary of State. Reaching Ottawa, he was presented with copies of the local evening paper, in which J. R. Booth, the lumber king, and W. H. Rowley, of the E. B. Eddy Co., condemned

#### IN THE STONE AGE.

An Amazing People Who Can Only Count Up to Three.

There is a wealth of material, it would appear, awaiting the famous Punch artist, Mr. E. T. Reed, for another series of his popular prehistoric sketches. According to a correspondent of The London Times, there are in Northern Australia, from the Queensland borders through the northern territory into Western Australia, quite a number of primitive people, wearing no clothes, unable to count beyond three, and to-day making and using the implements and weapons of the Stone Age.


A noteworthy characteristic of these primitive people is that they never express surprise or curiosity by outward physical signs, no matter what is brought to their notice. For this reason they have been characterized as stupid. But The Times' correspondent referred to - Mr. W. E. Roth, commissioner, Pomeroon District, British Guiana-after ten years' intimacy with the North Queensland savages, says that he has learnt to have a very high opinion of their intelligence. Referring to an effort on the part of one traveler to excite their surprise by striking matches in front of them and doing other things which might interest them, but which only caused them to turn their heads away,

Mr. Roth says:-"I also have been guilty of striking matches to excite the curiosity of the untutored Australian black," and he ceased to perform the match-striking trick for the following reason. "Having struck match after match before a crowd of natives," he says, "who showed not the slightest signs of surprise, notwithstanding that a lucifer box was an absolute novelty to them. ANOTHER APPEAL.

Mr. Borden Delivers Himself of Patriotic Manifesto. Halifax, Sept. 19 .- Mr. R. L. Borden to-day issued a manifesto to the electors of Canada, in which he said ,in

As this campaign closes and the solemn duty confronts us of deciding very probably for all time, the most momentous question ever submitted to the Canadian electorate, I declare with perfect sincerity to my fellowcountrymen that the outlook is full of hope. The keen attention which the people have given to the discussion of this question has made the few weeks of this campaign far more revealing than months of ordinary debate. Throughout this Dominion the electorate now understand that they are called on to determine, not a mere question of markets, but the future destiny of Canada, perhaps of the Empire. Even upon the economic side, the

reciprocity compact is but a step in a greater process. On either side of the boundary line its advocates realized perfectly that in its final outcome this treaty undoubtedly means the commercial and fiscal union of Canada with the United States. The chief magistrate of the great republic has warned us in language of striking and unmistakable import that the consummation of this treaty will forever prevent the consolidation of our Empire. With profound insight and clear vision, he has made the memorable declaration that if Canada accept this compact she can never become a part of that great imperial commercial band which, as he anticipates, will reach from England around the world to England again. We must make our choice between reciprocity within the Empire and reciprocity with the United States. And let us never forget that Canada cannot become fiscally and commercially a part of the United States and remain politically a part-and an important part -of the British Empire.

The relations created by this compact will increase threefold the power of the United States over our commercial destinies. Less than two years ago by the threat of prohibitory duties they forced our Government to alter our tariff. Do not imagine that the spirit which compelled this unwarranted concession to our powerful neighbor will die on the morrow of its first great success. we accept this compact, we must anticipate a renewal of the attempt. Where is our guarantee that the renewed pressure will be met in any firmer fashion than before? We recognize our constant duty to maintain the most friendly relations with the great neighboring nation, but I ask you to believe that such relations can best be assured if we preserve in fullest measure our present fiscal independence and autonomy. Above all do not forget that the mo-

mentous choice which you must make is for all time. If the tariffs of the two countries are interlocked by this treaty, be assured that the stronger party will always carry the key. This question is above all parties

and all individuals. I appeal to Liberals as to Conservatives, and I speak to them not as a party leader, but as a Canadian citizen, whose hopes are bound up with the hopes of his country.

To all who are proud of her past, to all who hope for her future, I make an earnest and sincere appeal to rise above all party ties, to take heed of the higher considerations and to determine their course with a sense of the enduring results of their decision. entreat them not to swerve from the straight path that leads to the making of a great nation. Sir Wilfrid Receives a Telegram From the Nationalist Candidate In Quebec East, In Which Latter Says His Resignation Was Extorted-Would Have No Effect on Contest In Soulanges. Que.

Ottawa, Sept. 19 .- Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in a statement issued yesterday, undertakes to resign his seat in Quebec East, if the story of Rene Leduc. that his resignation was extorted from him, is substantiated. The Premier's statement reads: Last evening I received the follow-

ing telegram: "Quebec, Sept. 17, 1911. "Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Ottawa:

"One of your most important chiefs in Quebec East extorted from me, while I was under the influence of while I was under the influence of liquor. my resignation as candidate GLASSES against you. It is a foregone conclusion that if he earries Soulanges, he will elect to sit for Quebec East and Lortie will go up
