

GREATEST MAN HUNT IN WEST "BILL WILSON" RUN TO FARTH Big Force Ordered to Relief of

Hannah, N.D., Sept. 17.-Run to | . earth after four days of the most spectacular man hunt ever witnessed in Western Canada, the kidnapper of Miss Gladys Price was taken at nine o'clock yesterday morning, three miles north of Hannah, just south of the boundary. He confessed fully his part in the outrage, and waived extradition. He tells an amazing story of his criminal life, declaring that he is an

escaped convict from California, where BURNING he was serving a three-year term. The capture came as a climax to the most persistent and most puzzling pursuit known to the Manitoba police. Early Saturday morning the fugitive appeared at the home of Farmer Timothy Hiller, north of here, three miles. He wanted food and said he was famished. He was recognized at once. The farmer fed him and at the same time sent a messenger hurriedly to Hannah. The desperado, when led, asked for a razor, saying ne wanted to shave himself. This operation he did easily, showing the tremendous nerve he still retained. He looked haggard and fatigued. After half an hour and knowing that armed men were searching for him everywhere,

Joliette, Que., Sept. 18.—Sir Willrie 2. Laurier arrived here Saturday evening at 6 o'clock and addressed a gathering of 8,000 people, who, notwithstanding that this town is a hotbed of Conservatism, cheered the Premier enthusiastically.

Here an important announcement was made by Hon. C. R. Devlin that a telegram had just been received from Quebec that the Premier had been elected by acclamation, owing to Remi Leduc's withdrawal. 
