GREATEST MAN HUNT IN WEST "BILL WILSON" RUN TO EARTH

Hannah, N.D., Sept. 17.—Run to earth after four days of the most spectacular man hunt ever witnessed in Western Canada, the kidnapper of Miss Gladys Price was taken at nine o'clock yesterday morning, three miles north of Hannah, just south of the boundary. He confessed fully his part in the outrage, and waived extradition. He tells an amazing story of his criminal life, declaring that he is an escaped convict from California, where he was serving a three-year term.

TORRENTS OF LAVA

Eruption of Etna Is Driving Out the Natives.

BURNING FRUIT GROVES

The People of the Sicilian Towns of Castiglione and Francavilla Flee When Molten Rock Reaches Three Miles of Them and Seek Higher Places—Twenty Thousand Persons Are Now Homeless.

Catania City, Sept. 15.—The 20,000 citizens of Castiglione and Francavilla turned their backs on their homes yesterday, fleeing before the advancing flood of lava from Mt. Etna. Both towns are threatened with destruction.

When the stream was within three miles of Castiglione and Francavilla the people collected their portable property and with their farm animals and household pets, made for the higher places.

A Youthful Burglar. Montreal, Sept. 15.—Emile Harpin, the 19-year-old lad, who was arrested by Detective Mercier and Lafard, charged with breaking into twenty residences, pleaded guilty to all the charges.

It Was an Alibi. St. Catharines, Sept. 15.—Last Monday night Walter Leyden's barn in Louth Township was burned, and John Stanton, a well-known resident here, was arrested, because several witnesses swore they saw him in the neighborhood.

Low Water Giving Trouble. Kingston, Sept. 15.—Owing to low water in the lower canals the steamers Westmount had to lighten 30,000 bushels of oats on her way to Montreal; then 8,000 more had to be taken out at Prescott.

Desperado at Bay. Snowflake, Ont., Sept. 15.—At bay in the forests along the international border, William Henry Wilson, the kidnapper of Gladys Price, shot one of his pursuers, William Adams, proprietor of the Western Hotel at Snowflake, and after firing repeatedly with an automatic gun, again escaped the posse Wednesday night.

HELP FOR CHENG TU

Big Force Ordered to Relief of Besieged City.

CANADIANS AT CHUNG-KING

Missionaries Who Were Stationed at Lu-Chow Are Reported to Have Reached Chung-King in Safety—Ringleaders of Sze-Chuan Revolt Are Arrested on Their Way to Start New Rising.

Peking, Sept. 15.—Unpublished edicts order a large force of Wu-Chang troops to leave immediately by the quickest route for Sze-Chuan and Tuan-Fang, director-general of the Hankow-Sze-Chuan Railway, who is expected at I-Chang to-day, to hasten the movement of the troop train. The arrested ringleaders of the rebellion include the president and vice-president of the Sze-Chuan Provincial Assembly. The latter was arrested at Hankow, whither it is believed he had journeyed with the intention of fomenting an agitation in Hupeh Province.

Canadians Safe. Chung-King, Sept. 15.—The revolution is fast gaining ground. It is believed that no food has entered Chengtu for many days, and probably already the besieged are on short rations. Heavy firing is reported from that quarter between the loyal garrison and the rebels, among whom there are probably many soldiers.

Duck Hunter Had Experience. A report has reached town that a local duck hunter had an exciting experience down the river yesterday.

Ducks Said to Be Plentiful. Reports from the duck hunters are to the effect that there is plenty of game in this district. Mr. Harry Bryans yesterday bagged 28 ducks and Mr. J. Dixon, of Toronto secured 25 birds.

Fairview Farm on Top. Messrs. J. & D. Campbell, Fairview Farm, Woodville, were the breeders and exhibitors of the championship Shropshire ram at the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto.

Sale of Live Stock. This morning the market clerk was kept busy weighing stock at the market. Messrs. Herb Graham and Wes. Waldon each brought in a big bunch. They were bought by Messrs. P. B. McIlhargey, T. Arnold and M. O'Halloran.

Were Prize Winners. Messrs. Geo. Simpson and Herb. Williamson have been in Peterboro at the Fall Fair, showing their ponies. Mr. Simpson won first and the sweepstakes, and Mr. Williamson won 2nd. Both these horses are fine ones, and the owners are to be congratulated on the standing they took.

LAURIER ELECTED BY ACLAMATION LIBERALS HAVE LEAD OF THREE

Joliette, Que., Sept. 18.—Sir William Laurier arrived here Saturday evening at 6 o'clock and addressed a gathering of 8,000 people, who, notwithstanding that this town is a hotbed of conservatism, cheered the Premier enthusiastically.

Here an important announcement was made by Hon. C. R. Devlin that a telegram had just been received from Quebec that the Premier had been elected by acclamation, owing to Remi Leduc's withdrawal. The crowd cheered wildly as the speaker said that it was a just tribute to the greatest of Canadian statesmen.

The Premier devoted an hour's speech to an exposition of the navy bill. So clear and strong did he make his case, and so emphatic was he, that with the sweltering heat his collar wilted and the perspiration ran down his face and neck.

The Premier in Grand Mere predicted victory, and said that Liberals all over the country had no need to regret their votes, for the Liberal program had been carried out. In 1896 false prophets had urged that the churches would be destroyed and religion ruined, but the Liberal program was wide enough to shelter all creeds and classes.

The Premier explained the naval scheme carefully and refuted the attacks of the Nationalists, in whose naval ideas lay one salient feature of that destroying Laurier. But it was easier to say than to do.

The assertion was absolutely false that there would be obligatory service. In the Cartier naval scheme it had existed, but had been eliminated by the present Liberal Government.

The following players represented Lindsay: Williamson, Day, Hopkins, Flurey, Cain, Spratt, Preston, Langdon, Dennison. Day Williamson and Langdon were the Lindsay battery.

A large number of Lindsay citizens attended the fair and report a good time. The people of Woodville and surrounding country are to be congratulated on the success of their annual fair.
