Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Sept. 16 .-Provincial fire chiefs of Ontario, numbering 30. met in convention here yesterday. He was picked up as a drunk, but in his possession was found several articles of jewelry which the police afterwards learned he offered for sale around town When questioned, Bach said he puchased a bracelet from a Brockville man and was made a present of the other articles. A description of the articles tallies with some of the goods missing from the factory town. The Cornwall authorities have been communicated with.
