LINDSAY FAIR CLOSED SATURDAY 15,000 PEOPLE IN ATTENDANCE

Lindsay's great fair of 1911 is now a thing of the past. With the playing of God Save the King on Saturday evening, what was considered one of the largest, finest and most successful exhibitions in the history of the town was brought to a close...
