WARMER WEATHER PREDICTED FOR SEPT.

July this year had a hot spell. The temperature at one period bid fair to rival those of 1911, but the highest attained was only 95 degrees, which occurred on the 8th. This warm weather, however, was offset by a period of semi-Arctic character, which did much to bring the average temperature for the whole month down to 69 degrees, which, according to the records, was only one-half a degree above the average. But now comes an abundantly hot spell in September. Sunday, the 8th was the hottest of the month, and also the coolest at one part of the day. The highest temperature was 85 and the lowest 54 degrees. The average temperature so far has been 69 degrees, which is the same as that of July.

GETTING OUR SUMMER
It certainly seems a strange freak of nature when it is evident that August weather is only beginning to creep in now, and making up for the past cool summer. This warm spell is also, according to an authority of the weather bureau, likely to remain that for some time. The whole continent, both Canada and the United States, has become heated up, and there are no signs whatever of a change in temperature.

"All last winter and this past summer," said the weather man, "the conditions have been such that a high pressure area has been in the north and an area of low pressure in the south. This caused unusually cool weather. New conditions are reversed. The warm southern air is being drawn up northward, heating the atmosphere, and changing the cool September days into a real summer."




