Introducing his bill, Premier Asquith said that to have postponed the passage of the bill until after the termination of the war, he said, would have had a deplorable effect on the Irish race all over the world and on Irish recruiting.


Andrew Bonar Law, the Opposition leader, during whose speech the Liberals left the chamber, entered his protest against the bill introduced by Mr. Asquith.
