In the main building, the ground floor was the repository of a fine assortment of fruit, flowers, vegetables, dairy products, home made preserves, jellies, pickles, and plain and fancy baking. The display of ladies' work and fine arts upstairs was, in the opinion of competent judges, such superior to that of former years. During Thursday afternoon a baseball game on the fair grounds held the attention of a number who attended the fair. On Thursday evening an entertainment was given under the auspices of the Agricultural Society in Dickson's Hall. The entertainment, which was advertised as patriotic, musical and dramatic, should have attracted a large percentage of all classes of the community, particularly members of the Society under whose auspices it was given; who with a few exceptions were conspicuous by their absence. Rev. C. S. Lord ably filled the position of chairman, and gave a brief address. A solo, "The Boys of the Old Brigade," was sung in excellent voice and style by Mr. Jack Gordon, followed by a solo, "O Canada," by Rev. W. H. A. French, which was much appreciated. Mr. Cormier delighted the audience by the solo, "Madeline," and receiving an encore sang, "Indeed." A burlesque entitled, "Sister Masons," was given by a number of ladies and created much amusement for the audience. A solo, "Killarney," by Miss Doris Townley. A popular young vocalist, Mr. Cormier, in the solo, "Goodbye, Sweetheart, Goodbye," gave a splendid rendition of the song, and won the hearty applause of every music lover in the audience.
