All farmers should pluck their poultry dry and not scald them. They will not keep if scalded. Also them before killing. The local butchers say their customers will not buy them when scalded, and their market is spoiled. This is a point our farmers should bear in mind, and they should act accordingly.

Dryest Fall of 25 Years

Although the water on the Trent waterway is very low, as the water all over the country is, but still it will be all right for navigation until the close of the season.

"There is good water at Balsam Lake and Sturgeon Lake and south of Buckhorn," said the surerintendent of the Trent Canal to the Review, "And there will be enough water for power purposes it is expected until March. This is the dryest fall for about 25 years and in the Ottawa river, where the water was thirty-one feet at this time last year it has taken a drop of 27 feet, making its depth now only 4 feet."
