MAJORITY STILL 50

Revised Lists Show Few Changes in the Standing.

TEMPLEMAN'S GOOD FIGHT

Victoria Minister Lost Seat by Narrow Majority of Five to G. H. Barrard—Loss of Caldwell's Seat in North Lanark is Counterbalanced by McCool's Victory in Nipissing—Macdonald in N.S.

Toronto, Oct. 28.—The aftermath of the election reveals few changes. There are still several ridings in which the official returns when completed may alter the figures, but, according to the latest returns, the majority for the Liberal Government still stands at 50.

In North Lanark it was at first thought that Mr. T. B. Caldwell had succeeded in retaining the seat for the Liberals, but this anticipation was not borne out by the official returns, and last night the riding was conceded to his opponent, Mr. W. Thornburn, though only by a bare majority.

This change was counterbalanced, however, by the election for Nipissing of Mr. G. A. McCool, who in the earlier reports was stated to have been defeated by the Conservative candidate, Mr. G. Gordon.

So far, therefore, the position of the parties in Ontario remains as at first announced, namely: Conservatives, 47; Liberals 38, though there

HON. R. W. SCOTT. He May Become Speaker of Senate. An unconfirmed rumor that Mr. W. R. Smythe has, after all, ousted Mr. A. E. Dymont from East Algoma. In Nova Scotia the Conservatives have to content with six out of the eighteen seats, Mr. E. M. Macdonald, the brilliant young Liberal lawyer of Pictou, winning out against his redoubtable opponent, Mr. C. E. Tanner, who was yesterday credited with the victory.

Two changes in the first list of returns are reported from British Columbia. After a stiff fight, Hon. W. Templeman has gone down in Victoria; his opponent, Mr. G. H. Barrard, the Conservative candidate, with a majority of five, making the only breach in the ranks of the Liberals, but there is consolation for Liberals in the fact that Mr. Ralph Smith has retained his seat by a substantial majority in Nanaimo.

Though the Manitoba returns are still somewhat doubtful in one or two instances, they point to a gain of another seat by the Conservatives, later despatches conceding the defeat of Mr. S. J. Jackson in Selkirk. It is not all improbable that the Speakership of the Senate will be given, when Parliament assembles, to Hon. R. W. Scott, the late Secretary of State.

VERULAM COUNCIL The council met at the town hall, Bobcaygeon, on Monday, Oct. 17, the Reeve, E. Tiers, Esq., in the chair, and Councillors Geo. Brooks, W. Green, W. Hetherington, and John Mitchell, present. Applications for the trusteeship were presented from Messrs. William Thurston, Jas. Litgow, G. W. Taylor, and on motion of Messrs. Green and Mitchell, Mr. Taylor was appointed. On motion of Messrs. Hetherington and Brooks, the salary of the treasurer was placed at \$75 a year, including cost of a guarantee bond and surety, such surety guarantees bond to be not less than \$5,000. By-law appointing treasurer and naming sureties, passed accordingly. On motion of Mr. Hetherington and Green, Messrs. Brooks and Mitchell were appointed to audit the books of retiring treasurer and subsequently reported having found them correct. The reeve reported that gravel had been found on the line between 9 and 10, con. 19, and the owner of 9 proposed dividing the cost of survey to show what was on the road, and on motion of Hetherington and Green, the reeve was authorized to have the line surveyed. The clerk reported the receipt of a cheque of \$2,000 from Dominion government for claims preferred for the swamp roads. Mr. Hetherington reported having repaired the Graham culvert at a cost of \$1. The reeve and clerk were authorized to execute a quit claim of gravel pit to J. J. Thurston.
