A few years ago the old Rogers dam was washed away, the consequence being that the basin above the dam is almost dry. When the logs came down to be washed through, it means a serious waste of water.

This will now be provided for, and the water will be saved. This waste of water has meant the frequent shutting down of several of our large industries, which means a big loss ta them. Every effort will be made to correct this state of affairs which has been allowed to exist much too long.
