SPLENDID RECEPTION ACCORDED THE MINISTER OF MILITIA BY LINDSAY CITIZENS TODAY

The citizens of Lindsay extended a royal welcome to Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, in his arrival in town to-day after having been sworn in as a Minister of the Borden administration. Citizens of all shades of politics joined in the welcome extended, and the different trains brought in contingents from outside points who also joined in the festivities. The town presented a gala appearance. The firm of J. J. Turner & Sons had been given the contract of decorating Kent-st., and they lived up to their reputation as expert decorators. The decorations were of an elaborate nature and the train thoroughfare as well as Lindsay-st. to the C.P.R. station was resplendent with flags, bunting and appropriate mottoes. Mr. Jos. Brown had this part of the work under his supervision. The merchants, too, decorated their store fronts and the town never presented a finer appearance. Everyone vied with each other in making the welcome as hearty as possible. His Worship Mayor Beal had proclaimed a half holiday during the afternoon, and the school pupils were also given the afternoon. At 11 o'clock the local committee having the arrangements in hand, boarded a special C.P.R. train in order to meet the Minister of Militia on his arrival at one of the stations between Lindsay and Burketon. The committee was joined by Mr. J. H. Burnham, M.P., and Mr. Harry Phelan, M.P., of Peterboro; Mr. Munson, M.P., and Mr. Dick Turpin of Cobourg, the latter gentleman having accompanied Col. Hughes to South Africa; Mr. J. H. Delamere, Minden; Mr. Banister, Haliburton; License Inspector Lithgow, Bobcaygeon; Reeve Vrooman, Lindsay. Shortly after twelve o'clock a guard of honor from the 45th Regiment, with the regimental band, the members of the Town Council, and citizens assembled at the C.P.R. station, awaiting the arrival of the special. The platform was crowded with an immense throng, and when the train pulled into the station the Minister was accorded a hearty welcome. As soon as the Minister made his appearance he was greeted with tumultuous applause, and it was with some difficulty that a passage was made for the cab in waiting. In a few minutes the procession was formed, and proceeded up Kent-st. to Central Park, in the following order: Mounted Marshalls - Major F. H. Hopkins and Chief Chilton, 45th Regimental band. Guard of honor from 45th Regiment. Cab containing Mr. Minister of Militia. Cab containing J. H. Burnham, M.P., West Peterboro; C. H. Munson, M.P., West Northumberland; R. Turpin, Cobourg, and Harry Phelan, Peterboro. Cabs containing Citizens' Committee, members of Town Council, and town officials. Members of Board of Education. Automobiles containing citizens from town and other parts of the riding. The streets were lined on either side by hundreds of people, and with the band playing Annie Laurie, The Lass of Gowrie, and the factory and locomotive whistles blowing lustily, together with the explosion of giant fire crackers made the occasion one long to be remembered. Central Park was the Mecca of hundreds of people who cheered the Minister of Militia to their heart's content. THE CHAIRMAN. Mr. J. H. Delamere, of Minden, president of the Liberal-Conservative Association of Victoria and Haliburton,

occupied the chair. The children of the school sang The Maple Leaf, and several selections were rendered by the band. Mr. J. H. Delamere, in a few well chosen words, referred to the high honor which had been conferred on the constituency of Victoria and Haliburton, and its popular member, by Hon. R. L. Borden. The next speaker was DR. BLANCHARD, president of the Liberal Association of Victoria and Haliburton, who, on behalf of the riding welcomed the newly appointed Minister of Militia and he was warmly cheered on rising to speak. Dr. Blanchard said that it was on just such a day as this that the election took place. The party was now flying the flag of truce. He congratulated the Conservative party of the riding and of the Dominion, on Mr. Borden's selection of a Minister of Militia. He also thanked the people for turning out in such large numbers and welcoming the Colonel, the Hon. S. Hughes, Minister of Militia. C. H. MUNSON, member elect for West Northumberland, next spoke for a few minutes. He was greeted by cheers on rising to speak. Col. Sam Hughes is a household name, not only in the Dominion but throughout the world. Who has not heard of the Colonel's adventures in South Africa? Not a Canadian but was proud of him. All honor to the man whom the Hon. R. L. Borden has chosen as one of his lieutenants. The new minister was presented by little Miss Ida Brown with a bouquet, after which MAYOR BEAL, on behalf of the Town Council, read the following address, welcoming the new Minister of Militia to his home town. Lindsay, Oct. 11, 1911 To Col. the Hon. S. Hughes, M.P., Minister of Militia and Defence. Dear Sir - With extreme pleasure I acceded to the desire of the people of Lindsay represented in the Municipal Council, and tender you our most cordial congratulations on your appointment to the high and important office of Minister of Militia and Defence in the incoming administration under the Premiership of the Hon. R. L. Borden. The aptitude you have ever shown for military science and the forceful ability which characterized your intimate connection with local military interests, as well as the broader pat-

riotism that all times found in you an earnest advocate, and by reason of which you have attained a distinguished place among the able Military Authorities of the British Empire, designated you for the responsible administrative duties which have been assigned to your fostering care. We keenly appreciate the honor your preference has brought to your constituency of Victoria and Haliburton, and confidently anticipate not merely local advantages but benefits to Canada and the Empire of far-reaching significance through your administration of a Department of the Government which had such intimate relations with ideals which will eventuate in a GREATER BRITISH EMPIRE, A GREATER POWER TO BEAR THE WHITE MAN'S BURDEN, A GREATER INFLUENCE FOR THE WORLD'S GOOD. Need I say to you Sir, that it is gratifying to your friends and constituents as it undoubtedly must be to yourself, that you are called upon to assume your ministerial duties under the auspicious leadership of a Prime Minister whose ability and personality has won the respect of the Canadian people and to whom his colleagues, accrues as a primary official duty, the distinguished honor of welcoming to our shores as our new Governor General, a Prince of Royal Blood in the person of His Royal Highness, Arthur, Duke of Connaught and Strathearn. Embued with the belief that your highest aspirations for useful service to Canada will be fully realized, I am, Dear Sir, Very respectfully yours, (SGD.) R. M. BEAL, Mayor. J. H. BURNHAM. West Peterboro's new member, was cheered on rising to speak. This is a proud day for Victoria and Haliburton and Col. Hughes. The Colonel told him a short time before that he was so well pleased with himself that he could kiss all the pretty girls in town. The speaker quite agreed with him. The Midland district should be proud of the man Hon. R. L. Borden has chosen as a member of his 'Cabinet'. The demonstration was not so much a tribute to Col., the Hon. S. Hughes as much as to the Dominion and the grand old British Empire. COL. THE HON. S. HUGHES, M.P., on rising to speak was greeted by prolonged cheering, after which the band rendered a selection.

"It would be idle for me to say that I do not feel highly honored." He felt that he would be more than ungrateful, if he did not thank the Liberals as well as the Conservatives Referring to the cause of the turnover in the Government of the country he said that a Montreal man when asked this question, said he did not know what his name was, but it was the man who wrote Rule Britannia; who was responsible. Every minister in the new Cabinet yesterday vacated his seat. The speaker wished to thank the Liberals who had said that they would allow him to be elected by acclamation. I purpose to so conduct myself as to bring no shame to the party in Victoria and Haliburton. It shall be my endeavour to follow the leadership of one of the ablest men, who has ever been called to the position of Premier. When signing the register yesterday the speaker said he turned back over the pages, and he hoped that in the future when others were signing their names in the book that they would not be able to point the finger of scorn at his name. He thanked the boys of his Old Regiment. He knew they would always be ready to do their duty in keeping the good old flag flying in all parts of the world. His comrades in the band, also came in for their share of praise for taking part in the day's proceedings. He thanked the school children for sing The Maple Leaf. He also thanked the people for the demonstration. On two other occasions he had been honored by the people of the district, before and after the South African war. Referring to what Mr. Burnham said with reference to kissing all the pretty girls in town, he said he would be only too pleased to perform that office for the whole constituency.
