While peat has been manufactured in those European countries similarly situated regarding coal deposits Canada, little was known in this coun try of those processes which proved after long and costly experimentation successful and economical, and which proved the basis of the successful peat industry of Sweden, Russia and Ger many. On this account many of those who interested themselves in peat in some of the Canadian provinces de pended upon processes of their own or of those who claimed to be in position as regards the adequate technichal knowledge for the manufacture Profest Against of peat fuel.


