CENSUS RESULTS ARE GIVEN OUT LINDSAY'S SHOWING A DISAPPOINTMENT

Ottawa, Oct. 18.-The decennial census taken in June last under the direction of Hon. Sydney Fisher is sorely disappointing. The census of 1901 showed a total population of 5,371,315: The late Government promised that the count in June would give a total of eight millions.
