



After these points nave been attended to I consider the main thing about successful poultry keeping is to keep everything sweet and clean about the poultry house and to keep the poultry free from vermin.

The pens in which our laying hens are housed, are each 12x12 and are in long continuous houses, 6 ft. 10 in. high. The pens have cement floors and straw lofts. When winter sets in two barrow-loads of sand are scattered over each floor and a foot of straw is placed on top.

The morning feed in winter, consists of a mixture of oats and wheat thrown in the straw, after which the straw is well shaken. The chickens are thus provided with plenty of diersise in finding their food. In the forenoon I place a mangel within reach of the hens. The noon feed is a boiled mixture of grain and potatoes and table refuse; when all is boiled well together, I thicken it with shorts. The

Toronto, Oct. 12.-Sir James Whitney has announced that in the near future the Ontario Legislative Assembly will dissolve and that a general election will be held during the early part of December. The exact date of dissolution has not yet been set, nor has the date of the elections.

The Cabinet Ministers held a long conference yesterday afternoon, and later the Premier handed out the following statement:

We have decided to dissolve the House in the near future, and I give this notice now, in order that there may be no suggestion that we desire to hurry the elections. The present Legislature has already existed longer than its predecessor and there are now ten vacant seats. The expense of bye-elections would be large-about \$15,000-and this expense would have to be duplicated in less than a year did we not dissolve now.

There are several other very important reasons for our decision-reasons of vital importance to the provincewhich I shall lay before the public in the course of a week or ten days, or perhaps earlier.

Owing to the length of time necessary for the preparation of the voters' lists in unorganized districts, the polling cannot take place earlier than about the first or second week in December, and the issuing of the writs will be held over until the latest date possible, in order to facilitate the revision of the voters' lists in older On-I expect that the successor to Mr.
