## Proceedings of Eldon Council

Joseph Dixon owner of lots 21 and 22 N. P. R., waited on council, stating that Commissioner W. F. McEachern had refused to recommend that bonus be paid for the fence he had erected opposite his lots, as the road allowance was left less than 66 feet. The Reeve explained that by-law stated that before the bonus was paid the fence must be of nine strands of wire and 4 1/2 feet high; must be erected on the proper road allowance lines cleared both inside and outside obstructions, so that there would be nothing to impede the snow from blowing freely through and finally, the Commissioner or Council must recommend the bonus to be paid before it can be. The matter was left over for future consideration.

Messrs. Budd and McFadden waited on the council to see that steps had been taken to get the drain known as No. 2, under way. The Reeve explained that he had made four trips to Thoron to interview the Reeve and Clerk, but found that they had not got the parties at the outlet to sign the papers that they would take care of the water, if they were relieved from cost of construction.

Spence-McFadyen-That the Reeve and Clerk be appointed to make arrangements to get the parties in Thoron to sign papers to take the water from District drained by proposed drain No. 2, (said district as described in Cavana's report on Drain No. 2, and that they be given full authority to make what arrange ments they think advisable to get an outlet for said water, in so far as the township council of Eldon is concerned.
