CAMPAIGN FOR TAX REFORM

Hamilton Spectator The fact that a provincial election is on the way should put heart into the Ontario Tax Reform Association.

For some years this Association has been battering at Sir James Whitney's office door, seeking a friendly hearing for its proposal to have legislation passed making it permissible for municipalities to tax land at a higher rate than the improvements thereon. So far Sir James has remained unresponsive to all appeals, preferring to stand by the old way.

But while the Ontario premier has thus stood, the governments of western provinces have been more progressive, and municipalities in that part of the country have been privileged to experiment with tax reform. And the result of this experimenting has been very much to the advantage of these municipalities. Just why Sir James should continue to refuse similar privileges to Ontario municipalities, nearly one-half of which have petitioned him in favor of the proposed change, it is difficult to understand.

There is nothing so terribly radical in the suggestion, nor is there any danger that as a result of its adoption, municipalities will go bankrupt and default in payment of their just debts. At its worst it is only a harmless experiment which, we submit, every municipality should be privileged to undertake should it desire. If after trial it should prove of no value, no one particularly will be hurt and a return can be made to the old way.

On the contrary, should it prove a success, none should rejoice more than Sir James Whitney, head of a progressive government.

Now that the elections are coming the Ottawa Journal suggests that all candidates be pledged by their constituents of this subject, so that when the house meets, Sir James will be met not only by petitions from municipalities, but by a solid body of opinion in his own following and among members of the Opposition, favoring the change. But possibly this will not be necessary. The premier may have been taking notice during the past year or two, and if he has, he will have a changed mind on this question. It may be that he will make tax reform a plank in this election platform. That would be even better.
