Bishop O'Brien's First Appointment

Peterboro, Sept. 25.—The newly-consecrated Bishop O'Brien, accompanied by Monsignor Stagni, Papal Delegate, announced at his old parish church of the Sacred Heart tonight the name of his successor, the Rev. John J. O'Brien.

The new pastor was born in Peterboro' 42 years ago and was educated at St. Michael's College, Toronto, and the Grand Seminary, Montreal. He was ordained a priest, September 17, 1898.

The parish of the Sacred Heart, in the city of Peterboro', is an important one and has flourished under the recently-consecrated Bishop O'Brien. Rev. J. V. Macaulay has been appointed curate.

MAN KILLED BY COASTING BOY

Woodstock, Ont., Sept. 25.—Charles Rush, of Michigan, here on a visit to his brother, John, was run into while out walking by a small boy coasting down the sidewalk in a small express wagon, and falling backwards, struck his head on the pavement so heavily that his skull was fractured. Mr. Rush died three hours later.

THOUGHT BOY SHOT HIMSELF

Madoc, Ont., Sept. 23.—The parents of Ella Franks, the 16-year-old girl who was found dead by neighbors late on Saturday afternoon, with a shot wound in the breast, believe she was accidentally killed by her 14-year-old foster brother, and that the boy has, in a fit of terror, slain himself. Search is now being made in the woods.

GRAIN MOVING

THOUGHT BOY SHOT HIMSELF

The boy, aged 14, was an adopted child, and the relationship between the two was affectionate as though they had been brother and sister. He had been out shooting, and between 4 and 5 the boy called at a neighbor's and got some pears to take home to the girl. Shortly after 5 neighbors who called found her dead in town at the time. The boy and his gun were missing.

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Ottawa, Sept. 23.—Raising chickens by electricity is the subject of a report received by the Department of Trade and Commerce from its Bristol commissioner. The application of electric currents, it is stated, stimulates the chicks, keeping life in the weakly ones, so that "a farmer could by the application of electricity to his poultry farm produce nearly fifty per cent. more chickens per annum at a cost which works out very much lower than the cost of producing the electrification."

THOUGHT BOY SHOT HIMSELF

"Assuming the above to be correct, it will be of considerable interest to farmers and others who raise poultry in Canada, and especially so to those in Ontario, and elsewhere who are within reach of a cheap supply of electricity," says the report.

BURGLARS IN CAMPBELLFORD

Campbellford, Sept. 25.—Mr. Thos. Cochrane, of Campbellford, had a thrilling experience with a burglar which he will remember for many years.

Mr. Cochrane is a watchman at the Campbellford power plant and is relieved at midnight by a Mr. Wagg, in whose home he boards and rooms. The former had returned to his room at about one o'clock and had only got into bed when he heard footsteps in the hall near his apartments.

BURGLARS IN CAMPBELLFORD

After he had got out in the open the burglar made good his escape in a clump of bushes nearby. Mr. Cochrane went back to bed and after lying down for a time an explosion occurred outside the house which shook the building, causing the bed to slide back and forth on its casters throwing Mr. Cochrane from one side of the mattress to the other, finally landing him on the floor. The night for him was one of dread as the explosion sounded like that of a bomb. A neighbor's cellar was looted that night by burglars, so it is thought that more than one questionable character was in the locality.

New Post Office For Peterboro
