did not discover it until the third search, not expecting such an unusual shot at that range.

When the signal of a bulls-eye was given, the young rifleman, without change of countenance, or uttering a syllable, turned slightly on his side and prepared for his next shot, his ninth on the 600 yard range, which also was a bulls-eye.

Pleased With Reception.

Lieutenant W. B. Hunter, in command of the Canadian team, is himself an expert rifleman. In the last international match held two weeks ago last Saturday on the Richmond Rifle range at Vancouver, B. C., between the teams of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, Lieut. Hunter made the high individual score with a total of 217 out of a possible 225. He scored 22 bulls-eyes in this shoot. Speaking to the Post, regarding Monday's shoot, Lieut. Hunter said, "We certainly are pleased with the treatment we have received in Aberdeen, and will try to shoot hard enough to be on the team that comes back here a year from next fall." On being told that it was the American idea to fraternize with Canadians in a joint defense, Lieut. Hunter said, "If we are to keep this continent a white man's continent, it may be necessary for the two countries to stand shoulder to shoulder, and that is the general feeling on our side of the line."

BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL STATISTICS

Peterboro, Oct. 21—Rev. P. K. Day-foot, superintendent of Sunday school work presented the report of the Sunday School Board to the Baptist convention this morning. The enrolment of scholars is 7,556, an increase of 1,988; teachers 609, an increase of 5,586, an increase of 462. The total number of schools is 11,733, an increase of 509, and scholars baptized numbered 1,606, an increase of 234. The schools contributed to missions \$14,700, an increase of \$1,550. They gave \$975 to the board and expended for school purposes \$34,158.97, an increase of \$5,081.
