"Despatches received here say that German troops have forcibly invaded the Portuguese province of Angola, West Africa. "Preparations are being made to

despatch immediately warships and troops from Portugal to Angola." Angola lies north of German Southwest Africa and borders on the Congo State, which, of course, belongs to Belgium. By traversing Angola and the Congo State the Germans would establish communication between their East and West African possessions. Recent despatches recorded the sending of 10,000 Portuguese troops to Angola under the escort of British warships.


