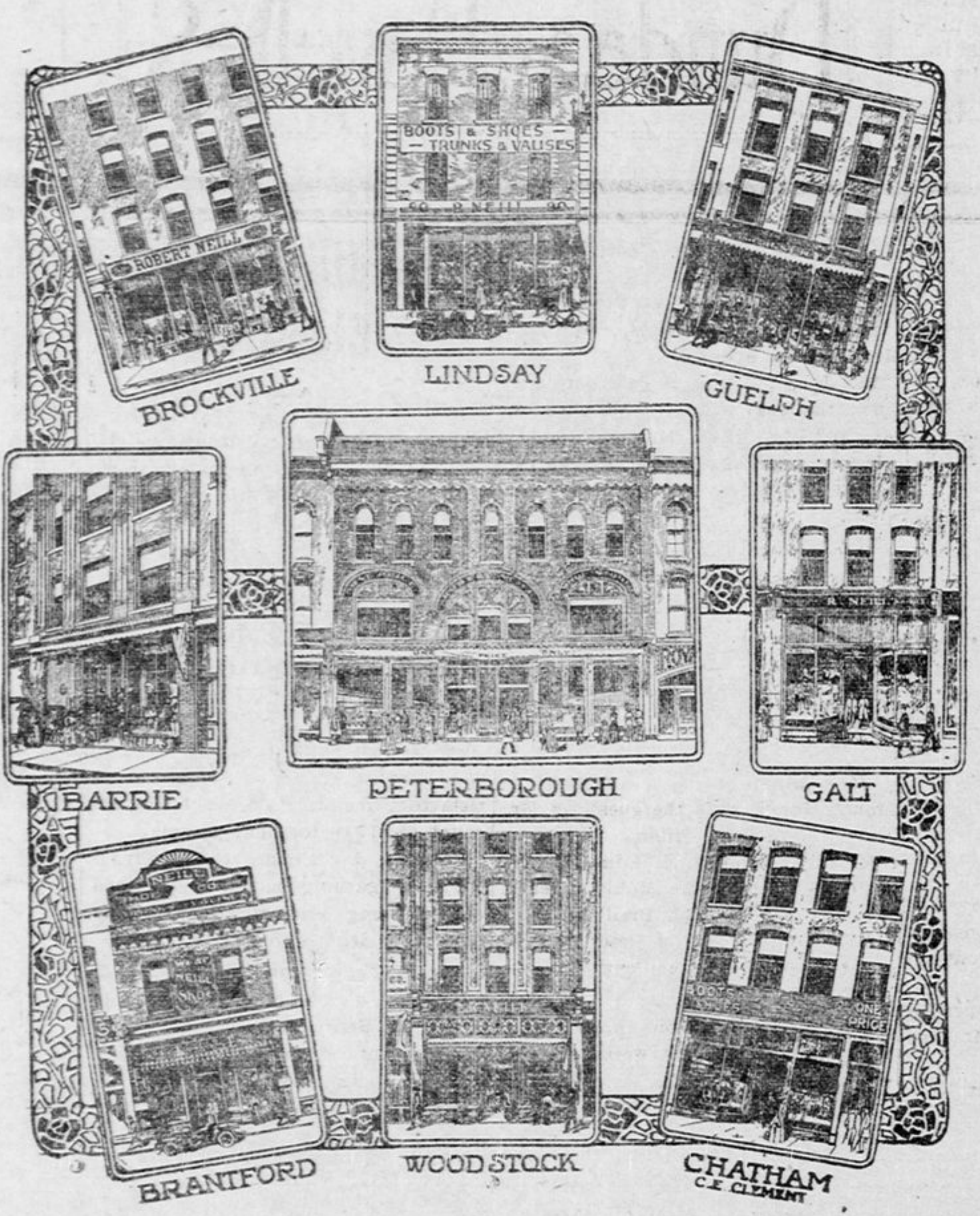

### GERMAN GENERAL KILLED HIMSELF

LONDON, Oct. 28.—A startling development of the day is the suicide of Gen. Hans von Beseler, the conqueror of Antwerp, who, according to late advices shot himself at his headquarters in Bruges and died almost instantly. This information comes by way of Rotterdam on what appears to be of good authority. No reason is assigned for his act.  
 Gen. von Beseler is the second high commander of the Kaiser's forces to take his own life since hostilities opened, of which information has reached the public. The first was the leader of the army which besieged Liege.
