LINDSAY, FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 19 SAM HUGHES' MEETING.

Evening Post of Nov. 21 We understand there was a Sam Hughes meeting in the Academy of Music last evening, the main features of which had been prearranged by Sam before the local committee were aware of the facts. Their names also appeared on the invitations personally delivered by the Colonel.

Entry to the meeting was by invitation, and the representative of The Post was not among those so honored. From such information as we have been able to gather, Sam occupied most of the time with a windy effort intended to be a political speech, but if it was a fair sample of what he treats the House of Commons to occasionally, it is not to be wondered at that he is the laughing stock of his own party, and that he has no influence with the government.

Mr. C. W. Foster's speech was not unusually short. It was, of course, a fine exhibition of trained eloquence, but as to the reliability of some of his statements, the most indifferent student of political history could have successfully refuted his stock-in-trade arguments if allowed a quarter of an hour's time and a quiet hearing.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Whitney got nearly \$2,000,000 from the Mining Department this year as compared with about \$45,000 in 1904. That is the result of Ross' railway policy which Whitney opposed. Whitney will find a way to dissipate the money.

Toronto Star: Sir Wilfrid Laurier has become the tower of an automobile which can travel at the rate of fifty miles an hour. The Premier had his choice of several slower machines, but wisely selected one that could keep pace with the progress of the country.

It has been reported in New York that Prince Arthur, only son of the Duke of Connaught, accompanied by a brilliant suite, will represent the King at the celebration next year of the centennial anniversary of the founding of Quebec in 1608 by Samuel de Champlain. The prince refused to accept his uncle's throne of Saxo-Coburg-Gotha, preferring to remain an Englishman, in spite of all temptations.

A proposition is now before the United States Government to set aside bird reservations and breeding grounds where the feathered tribe might be protected from the so-called sportsman and the bloodthirsty youth. Statisticians say the loss to that country alone resulting from the killing of birds and the neglect to properly protect them foots up to \$500,000,000. We do not know how they arrive at the result. But we do know that in Canada the annual slaughter of birds is a serious loss to the country, and that their extermination would be fatal to the agriculture of the country.

OF INTEREST TO FARMERS

A National Live-Stock Convention to be Held at Ottawa.

A meeting of the executive committee of the National Live Stock Association was held on Thursday, November 7th, at the office of the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa, to consider the calling of the next convention of that body. The meeting was attended by the President, Hon. John Dryden, Toronto, Ont., the Vice-President, Mr. Robert Ness, Howick, Que., Messrs. G. A. Gignault, Quebec, Arthur Johnston, Greenwood, Ont., and J. G. Rutherford, Live Stock Commissioner. Owing to illness the secretary, Mr. Westorrell, was unable to be present. The Hon. Sydney Fisher attended the meeting during the early part of the day.

Arrangements were made for the holding of the next convention at Ottawa, on February 5th, 6th, and 7th, next. These dates are selected so as to permit the breeders from Western Canada and also from the Maritime Provinces to attend the meetings of the cattle, sheep and swine associations, most of which will be held at the end of January and during the first few days in February, as also the Horse Show and meetings of the Horse Breeders' Associations which are arranged for the week following.

A programme for the convention was informally discussed but not definitely arranged. A number of subjects will probably be dealt with, but it is likely that the principal discussion will be on the advisability of amending the regulations governing the admission to Canada of pure bred stock. It is also proposed to take up and discuss the best means of retaining for our Canadian breeders the Canadian market for pure bred stock and it is probable that a number of specially prepared papers on this subject will be submitted. The future of our export trade in pure bred stock will also be discussed, while it is expected that considerable light will be thrown on our export trade in cattle and sheep for slaughter and also our export trade in meats and meat food products.

The fact that a majority of the live stock meetings are to be held immediately prior to the convention will render it possible for these bodies to definitely instruct their delegates as to the stand they are to take on the various subjects likely to come up for discussion. While this advantage will not be shared by a number of the horse breeders' associations, it is to be hoped that the latter will hold special executive meetings for the purpose of instructing their delegates to the convention.
