(To the Editor of The Post.) Dear Sir,—The elections are ended and with them has ceased one of the most interesting contests in the history of our fair Canada. The result in general is what most people expected, but in detail in some cases the result is rather disheartening.

In our own county, Victoria, we have men who boast of their "loyalty" to the cause of freedom, to their fellow-men and so on, and yet we find these same men lacking sadly when their faith is put to the test. As an example we quote Fenelon Falls and its support of Dr. A. Wilson. The village has ever found Dr. Wilson its friend, a man who was ever willing to help the needy, and ever ready to "boost" the town's best interests. What does Fenelon Falls do in return for its most excellent citizen? It gives him a mere majority of nine over Col. Sam Hughes. We ask in all fairness was this loyalty? We are afraid the answer must be in the negative. On the other hand, Lindsay, a town which gave the former Liberal a majority of twenty, turns around and gives its citizen a majority of one hundred and forty. There is an example of loyalty to your own man.

We do not wish to draw comparisons, but the figures speak for themselves, and we do not think that the citizens of Fenelon Falls and Fenelon township, and especially the members of the Methodist church lived up to the highest ideal of citizenship by not making the doctor's majority larger. In conclusion, we congratulate Col. Hughes and hope he will, in future, represent his riding in an ideal manner, and to Dr. Wilson we tender our consolation in the words of the Good Book, "He came unto His own and His own received him not."
