Saturday Market

Poultry had the floor at today's market, and the birds were piled in abundance on the tables. The attendance of sellers, too, was large, but the prices asked for the poultry were considered somewhat excessive, and will undoubtedly take a drop before the market closes. Chickens were ticketed at 12c lb, or 75c, 80c, and 85c per pair. Ducks commanded \$1 per pair, and geese 11c per lb. There was a plentiful supply of butter for sale, and the price asked was 26c and 27c. The supply of eggs was a fairly liberal one, and brought 22c, 23c, and 25c per dozen. They are very few apples being offered, in fact they are remarkably scarce. They sell for 50c a bag, and the price is expected to advance. Potatoes sold for 45c and 50c per bag; cream 15c to 20c per quart; sage, 5c per bunch; live hogs, \$5.90.

English Onions

Three carloads of onions, consisting of 2,000 crates, were, says the Standard of Empire, despatched by the Allan Line Royal Mail steamer Victorian, which sailed from Liverpool on August 28 last. They were discharged at Montreal on Saturday, September 5, and re-forwarded over the Grand Trunk Railway, lake and rail route, arriving at Winnipeg, Manitoba, early on the morning of the 14th ult., delivery being given to the consignees in first-class condition on the same day. City Officials of Lynn, Massachusetts Study its Efficiency

A Forbidden Weapon

Every traveller knows that there are certain restrictions upon the introduction of arms into foreign countries. Among the weapons which it is forbidden to take into France is the "tromblon," which is expressly mentioned in the Penal Code as a weapon the carrying and sale of which is not allowed. And yet the "tromblon" is not a firearm which is commonly used nowadays, for it is nothing else than the blunderbuss, a weapon which old caricatures show to have been carried by the guards of coaches as a protection against highwaymen and to have been hung over his fireplace by John Bull at the time of the scare of a Napoleonic invasion a hundred years ago. The blunderbuss had a flint lock, a short barrel and a muzzle like a trumpet, the bell mouth being designed to scatter the slugs with which the primitive piece was charged. Any one who buys one at an old curiosity shop had better take care how he introduces it into France, for the penalty for doing so is a fine of two hundred francs.
