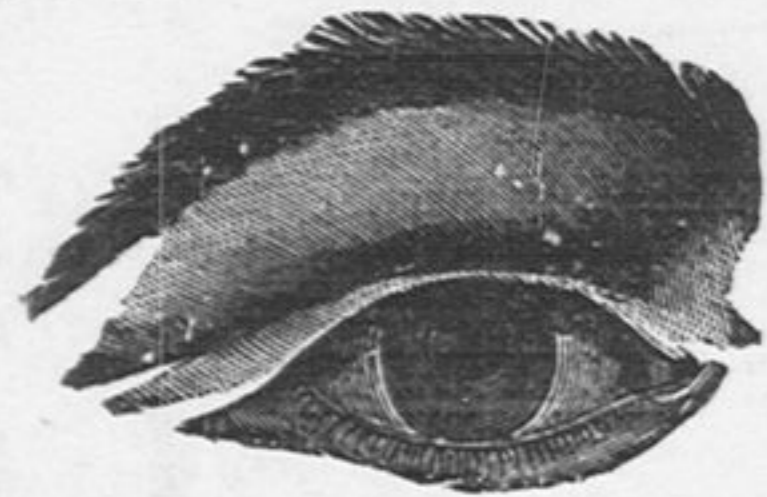

How to Kill Seeds in Measure

Experiments Which Have Proved Successful in This Regard

(From the Canadian Dairyman)

It is well known that there is considerable risk of introducing new weeds by the purchase of manure and hay and other feeding stuffs. E. I. Oswald, of the Maryland Station, undertook to obtain more definite information on this point, especially as regards dissemination through manure, by studying the effect of the fermentation of manure handled in different ways and passing through the digestive systems of animals on the vitality of various weed seeds, including seeds of about fifty of the worst weeds found in Maryland.

In experiments in which the manure remained (1) for six months in a barnyard heap, and (2) for a short while in piles as when shipped in caeloid lots from cities, it was found that in the first case there was no danger and in the second case little danger of distributing live weed seeds. In the experiments in which the weed seeds were fed to yearling steers and the manure handled in various ways it was found that—

(1) Where the manure was hauled directly from the stable as a top dressing an average of only 12.8 per cent. of the seeds fed to animals germinated.

(2) Where manure was hauled directly from the stable upon the land and plowed under, 2.3 per cent. of the seeds fed to animals came up.

(3) Where the droppings remained on the pasture fields unadulterated as they fell an average of only 3.1 per cent. of the seeds fed to animals germinated.

The results indicate that in general it is safe to assume that the vitality of weed seeds is destroyed in well-rotted manure, but that many pass unharmed through the digestive tracts of animals and may be carried to the land if the manure is not well rotted before use.

MARIPOSA COUNCIL

Messrs. Michael, Rogers and Swain were present at the opening of council, the reeve and Mr. Varcoe having gone to inspect a gravel pit. Mr. Michael was voted to the chair, when the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Mr. Samuel Walters was present to ask permission to place a tile drain on the east side of the road allowance from the corner of his farm northward across copression 11 to the creek, but no definite action was taken. Mr. Washington reports that the township share of the Dundas drain is completed and asks that Joseph Channon be paid the sum of three dollars for his services. Mr. Washington also presented an account of \$21.00 for inspection, but was not paid at present.

The reeve occupied the chair after dinner. Joseph Gregg asked the sum of \$20.00 for drainage purposes at lot 19, con 6, but on a compromise he was paid the sum of \$15.00. Messrs Robert Osborne and Rice had done some drainage at lot 1, con. 11 and 12, and were paid the sum of \$12.00. Mr. William Greenway put in a claim of \$90.00 for 45 cords of stone which had been filling up in his field for several years. Mr. John Stacey supported the claim pretty strongly and the account was paid. Messrs H. Printnell, Neil McLean, and Thomas Tamlin had not completed their cross fences to the wire fences on account of some lane fences that they intend building next year, and on giving their word that these would be completed in due time they were paid the bonus on their wire fences. Mr. Jackson, tenant for the Stewart estate, informed the council that gravel had been taken from the premises he occupies, and while being put to a considerable lot of trouble and expense, had received no compensation for his trouble. Mr. Ephraim Mallon stated that some misunderstanding had occurred in the raising of the school rates for S. S. No. 15. The trustees desired to raise the sum of \$650.00 but only asked for \$350.00, thinking that the council would raise the sum of \$300.00 of a general school rate although not included in the requisition, the reeve agreed that Mr. Mallon in his interpretation of the school act but the clerk pointed out that the same form of requisition had been used for the 24 schools in Mariposa for some 10 or 12 years and in only two cases had the requisition been misunderstood. Mr. Frank James, addressed the council respecting his contract at lot 11, con. 6, maintaining that his contract was finished, but Messrs. Watson and Varcoe, who let the contract, are quite positive that the contract is not completed. The commissioners, Messrs Mark and Stacey handed in their accounts respecting wire fences, and those who are not paid at this meeting are requested to complete their fences at once so as to secure the bonus at the December meeting. Mr. Lownsborough informed the council that he intended building a wire fence at lot north

half of 14, con. 9, Mariposa, next summer.

From Mr. Yarnold respecting his resignation as engineer of the township of Mariposa. From the clerk of Eldon stating that the reeve of Eldon would interview the reeve of Mariposa at the county council regarding the statute labor on the boundary line of Mariposa and Eldon. From Messrs W. R. Tiffin, superintendent of the G. T. R. Co. and Thomas Bullivant respecting their contracts on the Dunn drain. From Mr. Jonas G. Russel, tendering his resignation as inspector of the Hancock drain.

On motion of Messrs. Swain and Varcoe the resignation of Mr. Russel was accepted. On motion of Messrs Rogers and Swain by-law 634 was read the usual number of times appointing Mr. William Fowler inspector of the Hancock main drain and north branches. Some \$490 of accounts were ordered to be paid including \$140.00 for tile for the Dunn drain, \$90 to W. Greenway for stone and \$107 to the county for the use of the county stone crusher. Some \$195 of commissioners' accounts were paid including an account of \$77.00 to George Hicks for gravelling and repairing culverts, \$72.00 to George Coxe and for similar work. Bonuses to the amount of \$152.00 were paid in the north half of the township, and the sum of \$181.00 in the south half of the township after which the council adjourned till the 15th day of December next.

Different Committees at Work on Important Business

The county council opened its session on Wednesday morning at 10.30 o'clock. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A COMMUNICATION.

A communication was received from Mr. G. H. Hopkins, secretary of the Law Association, asking for the usual county grant of \$25 to the law library. The communication referred to the excellent condition of the library, which was not an institution for the legal fraternity alone, but also for the benefit of the county as a whole. The communication was referred to the proper committee.

RESOLUTIONS.

A resolution was introduced by Messrs. Fielding and Graham recommending the consideration by the finance committee of a grant to the chairman of the standing committee on county property.—Carried.

A resolution was also introduced by Messrs. Taylor and Bing, recommending that the standing committee on finance and assessment take into consideration and report on the advisability of making an allowance to the warden.—Carried.

The council then adjourned until 10.30 Thursday morning.

COMMITTEES.

At two o'clock this afternoon the educational committee went into session, and at 3 o'clock the property committee convened, followed at 3.30 by the printing committee.

INSTITUTIONS VISITED.

Wednesday afternoon the county council visited the house of refuge and report conditions in that institution in a first class condition.

They also visited the Ross Memorial hospital, where they were courteously received by the lady superintendent and shown through the institution. The members expressed themselves as delighted with the satisfactory conditions prevailing in this splendid institution.
