#### How to Kill Seeds in Measure

Experiments Which Have Proved Successful in This Regard

(From the Canadian Dairyman) It is well known that there is considerable risk of introducing new weeds by the purchase of manure and hay and other feeding stuffs. E. I. Oswald, of the Maryland Station, undertook to obtain more definite information on this point, especially as regards dissemination through manure, by studying the effect of fermentation of manure handled different ways and passing through the digestive systems of animals the vitality of various weed seeds, including seeds of about fifty of the worst weeds found in Maryland.

In experiments in which the manure remained (1) for six months in a barnyard heap, and (2) for a short while in piles as when shipped various ways it was found that-
