"I believe the Synod would do well to appoint a committee to take consideration of appoint ment to vacancies and advise the archbishop regarding them. It would, however, be most regrettable to allow the laity to have anything to do with the appointment of the clergy." In closing the speaker paid a tribute to the archbishop and said that it was a pleasure to have the Right Rev. Assistant Bishop present.


