COUNTY COUNCIL NOVEMBER SESSION.

(Continued from page 10) library, and would be there for all time. It was an absolute necessity.

Mr. T. Stewart said that the council readily gave grants to other libraries in the county, and none was more deserving than the law library.

Mr. R. J. McLaughlin, K.C., said the library would be there after they were all dead and gone.

His Honor Judge McMillan did not wish to impose his own ideas too strongly. The library was a county one, and the council should feel proud of it and support it.

The chairman—I assure you, gentlemen, the matter will receive our very serious consideration when taken up by the committee.

On motion of Messrs. Fielding and Young the warden was granted an allowance of \$200.

On motion of Messrs. Hopkins and Howkins the chairman of the standing committee on county property was granted an allowance of \$50.

The resolution of Mr. Howkins recommending committee to grant county constables a percentage in the collection of county licenses was next considered.

Mr. Howkins said complaints were made regarding peddlers and hucksters going through the county.

Mr. McNeillie—If the constable prosecutes he will get practically half of the fine.

Mr. Jordan cited an instance at North Star, where the pedlars were going through the county doing as they pleased.

Several of the councillors referred at length to this matter, and Mr. Jordan's motion carried, which recommended that the clause passed in connection with licenses in June, 1907, should not prevent an official's discretion in the matter, and that county constables be notified.

WHO PAYS THE PIPER? An account was read from the Lindsay Sanatorium amounting to the sum of \$12.50, re the maintenance for five weeks of an unfortunate woman who worked in a hotel, and was about to be confined.

Mayor Begg recited the history of this case. A local doctor placed the woman in the institution, and promised to notify the county authorities of the case, as it was understood she was a resident of the county.

Messrs. Parkin and Tiers moved that the county pay for her maintenance at the rate of \$1.50 per week for five weeks, and that she be placed in the house of refuge, providing she agrees to go, and remain for one year.

Mr. Eyres said the case should receive humane treatment, and all concerned should try and effect a settlement. He felt the town would be prepared to bear its share of the cost.

Mr. F. H. Reed in addressing the council referred to the excellent support given the work in this county,

was considered. Following your instructions the county treasurer and myself opposed the granting of the request, and in doing so brought to the attention of the board the documents which were submitted to the Honorable the Attorney-General of the Province in opposition to any effort that might be made to have the Jurors' Act so amended as to deprive counties of the power to limit the number of such courts.

On motion of Messrs. Michael and Howkins, the action of the county treasurer and warden was commended.

The action of the township of Fenelon re the closing and opening up of certain roads in that municipality, was ratified by the county council.

A statement of the expenses in connection with the quarantine of small-pox patients in the town of Lindsay during 1908, amounting to \$783.62, was presented. The county was liable to 40 per cent., and on motion of Messrs. Jordan and Young, its payment was ordered amounting to \$313.45.

An account of a similar nature from Somerville township amounting to \$207.75 was also ordered to be paid, on motion of Messrs. Fielding and Michael.

A communication was received from county solicitors regarding authority of justices of the peace in the county and also in regard to fines imposed.

Mr. Boate stated that his municipality had applied to the county council and secured the privilege of making the assessment. They took the previous year's assessment to base their statute labor on.

Mr. Howkins—I understand the work cost double and was done no better.

Mr. Parkin—His Honor Judge Harding, I believe, found the assessment roll in bad shape.

From insurance brokers of New York, regarding insurance on county buildings.—Filed.

From secretary of conference of charities and corrections asking county to send delegates to conference held next week. The warden, county clerk and treasurer and Mr. Tiers will attend.

From secretary of the united counties of Northumberland and Durham, asking council to assist in securing legislation regulating speed of automobiles, and also to make it illegal to operate them on Sunday.

From secretary of fruit growers' association extending thanks to council for assistance.—Filed.

From Sturgeon Point re discontinued action against town of Lindsay. The county was a party to said action, the costs in connection therewith being \$12. The costs were settled on motion of Messrs. Byng and Tiers.

Mr. Griffin—Omemece is dissatisfied at the treatment received. The council was not notified of the sitting and a member of the board of trade closed the deal with the commission.

Communications were also received of the receipts and expenditures of the municipality of Sturgeon Point,

SATURDAY. The concluding session of the county council was held Saturday morning with the Warden presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

REPORT ADOPTED. The standing committee on finance and assessment, through Mr. Watson, presented its report. The council went into committee of the whole on the report with Mr. Tiers in the chair, when the report was adopted as read.

BYLAWS SIGNED. A bylaw re opening and closing of roads in Fenelon township was considered in committee of the whole and was signed and sealed.

A bylaw re government of the house of refuge was considered by council in committee of the whole and on motion of Messrs. Parkin and Byng was signed and sealed.

A petition to be forwarded to the minister of public works re assistance in building Emily creek bridge was dealt with in committee of the whole and on motion of Messrs. Tiers and Byng was signed and will be forwarded to the Dominion government.

Another petition to the minister of public works re assistance in building bridges in the northern part of the county was also considered and was ordered to be signed and forwarded to the Dominion government.

A petition was also presented for presentation to the legislature regarding an amendment to bylaw regulating the speed and operation of motor vehicles on the public highways and further petitioning that such vehicles be prohibited from operating on Sundays and at least one other day in the year. The petition was ordered to be signed and forwarded to the provincial government.

Before the council adjourned Mr. Watson took the chair and AM. Jordan moved a hearty vote of thanks to Warden Mason for the able manner in which he performed the duties connected with that office. He felt it was only due and proper that the council should make manifest their gratitude for the courtesy and ability displayed by the warden. He regretted that he had decided to withdraw from the council and hoped that he would reconsider his intention and remain with that body.
