

Weeks Doings From Oakwood

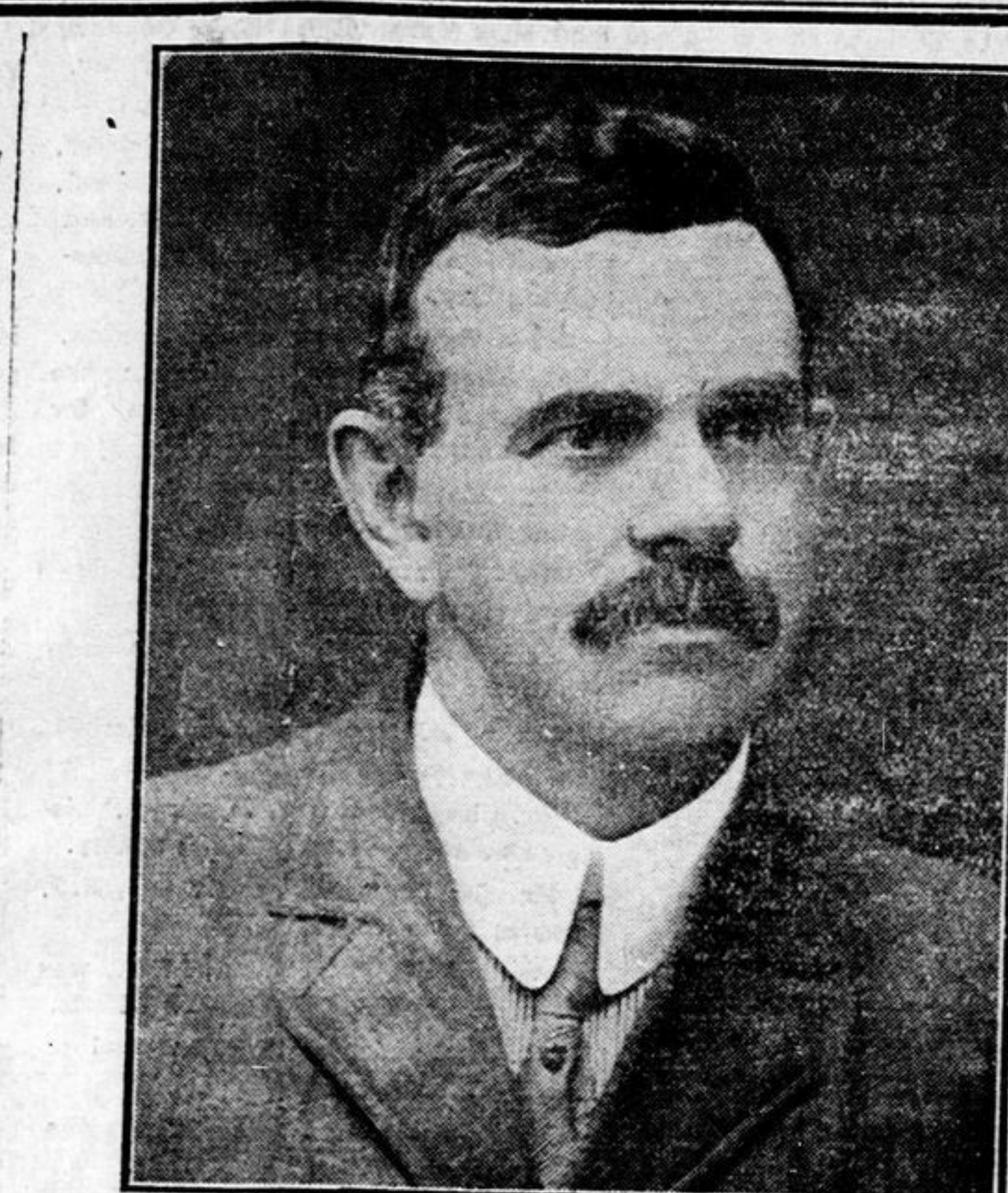

Weeks, druggist of Uxbridge, was for many years president of the Reform Association of North Ontario and a zealous friend and advocate of temperance and other moral reform movements in that County. He was called the Father of Music in that musical town. Mr. C. E. Weeks' mother was Sarah H., daughter of late John P. Plank, one of the pioneer settlers of Uxbridge, and one who espoused the cause of responsible government. Mr. Weeks received his early education in the Public and High Schools of Uxbridge at the age of nineteen years he entered the law office of the late John H. McGillivray, K.C., in Uxbridge. Here Mr. Weeks received his training in the legal profession, and in 1889 was called to the bar. He first practised his profession in Millbrook, and during his residence there served for two years as Lieutenant in the local troop of the Regiment of Cavalry. Mr. Weeks afterwards removed to Cannington, succeeding to the law practice of H. J. Sinclair. While a resident of Cannington, he was united in marriage to Miss Clara third daughter of Richard Edwards, banker. Mr. and Mrs. Weeks, it might be mentioned, expect to celebrate their silver wedding on Sept. 1st next. In December, 1892, Mr. Weeks moved to Woodville and organized the banking business of R. Edwards & Co., with which he has been associated, along with Mr. F. R. Edwards, his brother-in-law, ever since. Mr. Weeks is a popular resident of Woodville, and is always foremost in any good work tending to the advancement of the village and its people. He has been recording steward of the Methodist church, and Superintendent of the Sunday School for the past ten years, and last year was vice-president of the Laymen's Association of the Bay of Quinte Conference and one of the delegates to the general conference at Victoria, B.C. For two years Mr. Weeks was law partner with F. A. McDiarmid, now city solicitor of Victoria, B.C. and at present a member of the firm of Hopkins, Weeks & Hopkins. He enjoys the confidence and respect of members of the bar.
