STRONG TEMPERANCE SERMON ON SUNDAY BY DOMINION ALLIANCE REPRESENTATIVES

Yesterday at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church the pulpit was occupied by Rev. R. M. Hamilton at the morning service in the interests of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance.

I am surprised at the number of men who condone profits made on questionable enterprises. Business men are subject to a disease known as "commercial conscience."

He read the familiar story of the Good Samaritan, applying it to the cause of temperance. The parable divides people into three classes—robbers, passersby and helpers.

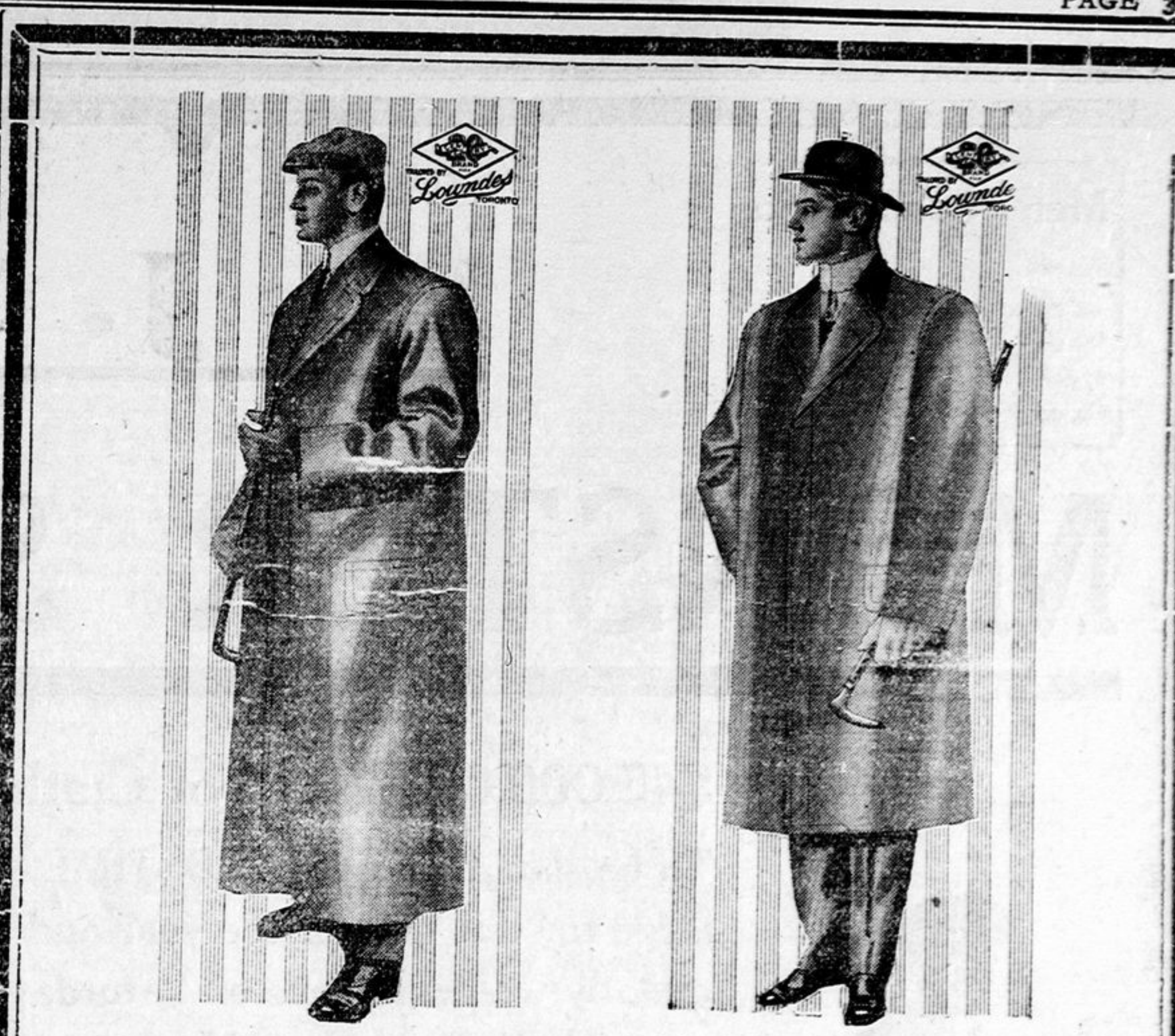

MAYOR BEAL SIGNS POWER AGREEMENT REDUCTION IN RATES STARTS TODAY

The following is a copy of the supplementary agreement between the Light, Heat & Power Company and the Corporation of the Town of Lindsay.

WHEREAS by agreement dated the first day of September, A.D., 1911, made between the Corporation and the Company, the Company was given permission to construct, maintain and operate transmission lines...

AND WHEREAS the Company has agreed to the covenants terms and conditions hereinafter set forth in addition to those contained in the said agreement made by the said Company.

Now THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises and the sum of One Dollar, now paid by the Corporation to the Company...

1. The Company covenants and agrees with the Corporation that it will have a pole line erected with all necessary appliances from the dam and source of supply at Peterboro or elsewhere in that district...

2. The Company further covenants and agrees with the Corporation that where an inhabitant or customer for light does not require more than three lighting attachments on his premises to supply him with light, it will not charge such inhabitant or customer the minimum payment of Six Dollars per annum...

3. The Company covenants and agrees with the Corporation that upon the written request of the Council it will have its engineer (without cost to the Corporation) report on the possibility of improving the street lighting system of the Town of Lindsay...
