FORMER LINDSAY BOY'S RAPID STRIDES IN THE AMERICAN RAILWAY WORLD

The following from the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle refers to a former member of the Post staff. Mr. James is a son of Mr. James James, a G.T.R. engineer, formerly of this town, but now a resident of Port Hope. His many friends will congratulate him upon his advancement.

"Coming as the accumulated result of eight years of service with the street railway company, Frank F. James, has been appointed assistant claim adjuster of the New York State Railways, Rochester Lines. During the period in question, Mr. James has had practical experience in nearly every department of street car operations, and it is conceded that this service especially fitted him for the important position he now occupies.

"It was in 1903 that Mr. James entered the employ of the Rochester & Sodus Bay Railroad, since become part of the New York State Railways, by the merger of several local lines already familiar traction history. During his early years with the Sodus Bay Line, he was in charge of the East Main street ticket office, at that time known as the Glen Haven office. His service in this capacity, attracted the attention of the late E. J. Wilcoxon, superintendent at that time, and Mr. James was promoted to be train dispatcher.

"Continuing in this position for some time, the next step in advance came when Mr. James was made chief clerk to Superintendent Wilcoxon: He

continued to sustain this confidential relationship when Superintendent Wilcoxon became division superintendent of the Rochester Railway Co., at its Eastern divisional office. It was at this time that the additional responsibility of assistant station master, was given to chief clerk James. When Mr. Wilcoxon was promoted from the position of division superintendent of the street railway company to that of general superintendent at the State-street offices, he retained the services of Mr. James as chief clerk, who continued in that position until Superintendent Wilcoxon's death in September, 1907.

"It was in 1907 that Edward J. Cook the present vice-president and general manager of the New York State Railways succeeded R. E. Danforth in that capacity, and Mr. James was made chief clerk, gaining such insight into the management of the company, that in the absence of Vice-president Cook, Chief Clerk James now acts as head of the corporation.

"With the creation of the complaint Department, of the New York State Railways in February of the present year, Mr. James was selected as chief, and now, eight months later, comes the further promotion to the responsible position of assistant claim adjuster. In this position, which as apparent has vital relationship to that of chief of the Complaint Department, Mr. James will be in direct charge of statements of claim, investigations, and the claim office.

THE MAIN PLANKS OF THE LIBERAL PLATFORM

Liberal party's program under new leader Mr. H. W. Rowell.

NEW ONTARIO DEVELOPMENT. Creation of Department of Immigration and Colonization; building of roads, providing drainage, loans to settlers on new clearings, assistance to pioneer schools.

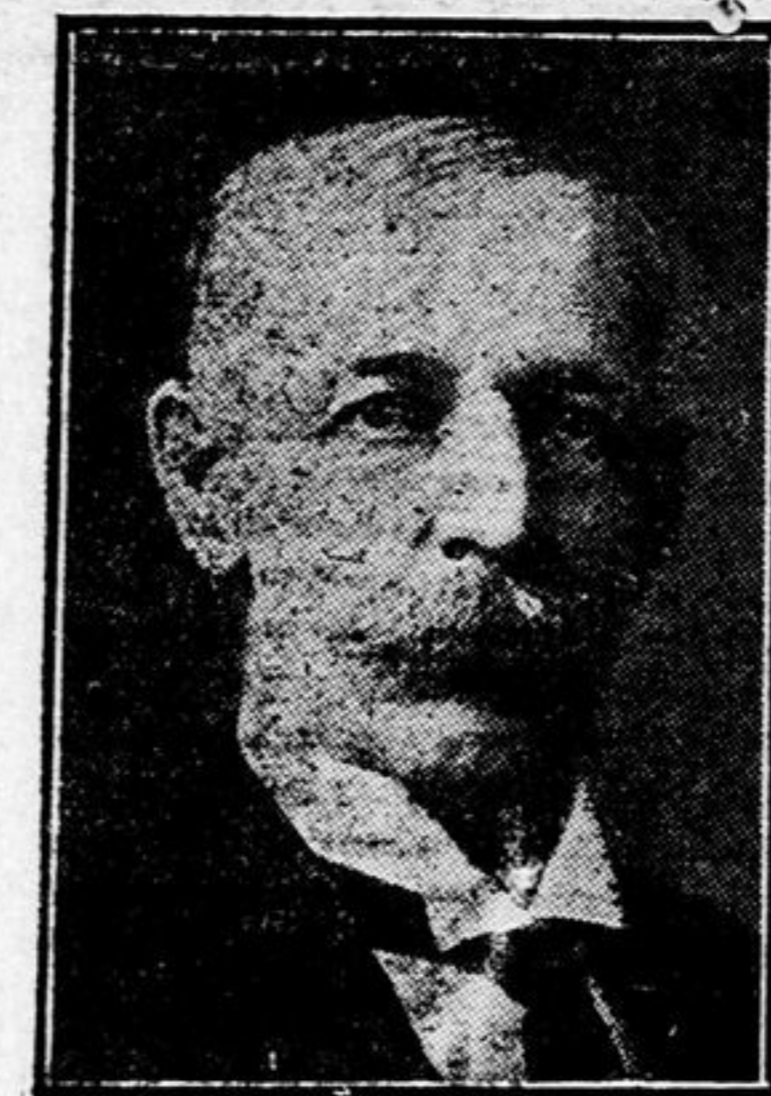
Restore colonization character of T. & N. O. Railway, put the railway under Dominion Railway Board allow it to be used in courts like other railways, make it pay municipal taxes; extend it to Hudson Bay. Reduction of mining fees for prospecting and recording; increased stability to mining titles; eight hour day for underground miners. Extension of boundary of Ontario to give the Province a navigable port on the Hudson Bay.

AGRICULTURE. A Royal Commission to suggest measures to prevent decline in rural population. Active immigration of suitable people for settlement and employment upon farm lands.

An issue of Provincial bonds to build good roads. Electric light and power and telephones for the farms of the Province. Technical instruction in farming in rural schools; demonstrating orchards and special technical instruction in apple growing districts; an annual National apple show; enlarge the experimental work in Guelph College, especially in stock breeding.

TAXATION. Grant municipalities permission to exempt improvements from taxation. Tax railways and other public utility corporations equally with the property of private citizens. SOCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL BETTERMENT. Abolition of three-fifths' clause in local option; removal from political influence of license administration. Workmen's compensation for all industrial injuries and payments insured. Advanced legislation for well-being of industrial workers; prevention of slums; suppression of tuberculosis and avoidance of occupational diseases.

EDUCATIONAL. Restoration of model schools and other measures for increasing supply of teachers. To provide thorough adequate training schools a sufficient supply of competent teachers, and thus insure under proper regulations that the pupils in every school in the Province shall receive a thorough English education. PUBLIC OWNERSHIP AND CONSERVATION.

Declaration for public ownership, and operating of public utilities. The acquisition and operation of telephone lines.

Reforestation; re-investing in the Crown all cut-over timber berths; sale of timber by public auction; better fire-rangin; assisting of municipalities to purchase and reforest waste lands.

OTHER PLANKS. Enlargement of powers and reorganization of Ontario Railway Board. Combat trusts, mergers and other combinations of capital. Free access to the courts to persons having complaints against Government or any Commission appointed thereunder.

A Civil Service Commission and appointments and promotions by merit after competitive examination. Prohibition of election contributions by corporations; publication of all election contributions; public prosecutor to prevent election contest saw-offs.
