LOCAL MERCHANT RECEIVES "APPEAL" FROM BANKER IMPRISONED IN SPAIN

On Monday Mr. W. B. Sparling found among his morning mail a letter from Spain. On perusing the contents he learned that it was from one "Alexander Sadowsky," whom, it is alleged, is a Russian banker, imprisoned in a Spanish prison. As will be seen by the letter an "appeal" has been made for assistance in order to save the fortune of the imprisoned man, and incidentally that of his "darling daughter."

The proposition is a fake, pure and simple—a frame-up in order to try and hoodwink the recipient in giving the "banker" assistance. Residents of other centres have, from time to time, been appealed to by this glib tongued sharper, who certainly pays a poor tribute to the intelligence of Canadians when he imagines that he can work them by such flimflamming methods.

The letter is as follows: "Dear Sir.—Although I know you only from good references of your honesty, my sad situation compels me to reveal to you an important affair, in which you can procure a modest fortune, saving, at the same time, that of my darling daughter. "Before being imprisoned here I was established as a Banker in Russia, as you will see, by the enclosed article, about me, of many English newspapers, which have published my arrest in London.

"I beseech you to help to obtain a sum of \$480,000 I have in America, and to come here to raise the seizure of my baggage, paying to the Registrar of the Court the expenses of my trial and recover my portmanteau containing a secret pocket where I have hidden the document indispensable to recover the said sum. "As a reward I will give up to you the third part, viz., 160,000 dollars. "I cannot receive your answer in the prison, but you must send a cable gram to a person of my confidence, who will deliver it to me. "Awaiting your cable to instruct you in all my secret, I am, sir, Yours truly, SADOWSKY.

"Direct answer by cable, not by letter, as follows: "Segundo Peados, Calle Pasion, 11 principal, Valladolid, (Spain). Per. Sparling." The newspaper clipping referred to is as follows: "ARREST OF A ST. PETERSBURG BANKER. "Some months ago, as our readers may remember, we referred in these columns to the great scandal caused in St. Petersburg, and in Russia generally, by a noted Banker, who absconded, leaving a deficit of over five millions of rubles.

"The Russian Police sought for him for a long time in vain, for it seems he had not left the least trace of his flight, and the continued search over Europe and America proved unavailing. "Yesterday, however, a Spanish Inspector, accompanied by two officers from Scotland Yard, and acting under instructions of the Spanish Ambassador, who had previously interviewed the Home Secretary arrested him on his way from the hotel where he was staying, to the steamship office. It seems it was evidently his intention to take passage from New York. From the information received by the Ambassador, he had been in hiding in Spain, where he lived with another man and with his daughter. A few days before arriving in London he had quarrelled with another Russian, who was mortally wounded by a revolver shot during the scuffle and only lived long enough to denounce his assailant.

"In an interview with the Russian Ambassador it seems that the name he had been using in Spain, and that he gave on being arrested was not his real one, Manassina being simply an alibi, but after comparing the prisoner with photographs in his possession the Russian Ambassador recognized him as Alexander Sadowsky, the criminal Banker who eloped with five million of rubles. He is a native of St. Petersburg, a widower 48 years old, with an only daughter that he left in Spain on escaping from that country.

"On being arrested, two of Manassina's or Alexander Sadowsky's portmanteaus were seized, but although strictly searched nothing but personal effects were found in them, in spite of which the Russian Ambassador declares that prisoner ought to have several million rubles somewhere. "The Russian and Spanish Ambassadors conferred yesterday evening as to whether the prisoner should be conveyed to Spain or to Russia, and after an interview with the Home Secretary and in accordance with the extradition treaty of England, Russia, and Spain, it was agreed that prisoner should be conveyed to Spain to stand his trial for manslaughter, and that only after his trial can the Russian Government ask Spain, through diplomatic channels, for his extradition."

BOUGHT 839 ACRES OF LAND

Stettler, Alta., Nov. 8.—H. P. Kennedy, of Toronto and Peterboro, and brother of Mr. F. Kennedy, of the Machine telephone Co. Lindsay, one of the largest live stock dealers in Canada, and the representative of an Eastern syndicate, was one of the principal purchasers in one of the biggest deals in the realty history of Edmonton, put through last week by Magrath-Holgate Company, Limited.

The sale involved 839 acres, adjoining the highlands to the east of Edmonton. The price paid was \$400,000. This property was bought two months ago off Wm. Short, of Edmonton, for \$300,000. Of the 839 acres, 320 were sold to a Calgary syndicate and the remaining 199 to a big Eastern manufacturing concern.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway runs through two quarter sections of this property, making the land valuable as a site for manufacturing concerns.

SHOULD BE A PENALTY

The killing of men by those who consider themselves hunters has begun in earnest since the season for shooting has opened. Men purchase firearms who should never be trusted with a gun, and once a year they go into the woods and blaze away at the first moving bush they see, pretending to think a deer is the cause of the motion and perhaps a human being loses his life. If everyone who is guilty of such recklessness was made to suffer the extreme penalty for the crime of manslaughter, it might mean some difference in the fatalities by causing the fool with a gun to stop and really think. The man who handles a gun but once a year, and then for only a few days, lacks the experience which a hunter should have, and especially the coolness that is so desirable. One cannot acquire the ability to hunt in a proper manner in the short time the amateur gunners spend in the woods. It would be far better to abandon the open season altogether and forbid the use of firearms than to practically approve the homicide that mark each hunting season.

OCEAN TO OCEAN FLIGHT

Aviator Rogers has reached the Pacific coast after a journey of 49 days, in which he covered 4231 miles. His actual flying time was three days, 10 hours and four minutes. The other 45 days were spent in resting and repairing, and he expresses an opinion that a flight from ocean to ocean in 30 days is an impossibility. His average flying time was one minute and a fraction over nine seconds per mile. It is a wonderful performance, viewed from any standpoint. It would seem, however, that it ought to be possible to reduce the consumed time, for Rogers was delayed by accidents that might not interfere with him on another trip. It might be possible to reduce the length of stops at the stations he had marked for coming down to the surface. What he had done will stimulate other aviators, and if not this year, we may expect to see it equalled or excelled by other ambitious man-birds.

ITALY WILL LOSE

The German military experts, General von der Goltz and Colonel Ruedigh, who have been discussing the prospects of the war between Italy and Turkey, are perhaps not quite impartial judges, for they have been employed in reorganizing the Turkish service, and naturally think it far superior to that of Italy. Colonel Ruedigh who is of the cavalry branch, says that Italy is sure to lose in the long run and that it will not be many weeks before news comes of a great disaster. Turkey, undoubtedly has much potential strength: the question is, how far, without an adequate navy, it can be brought to bear.

NO WORD FROM LOCAL HUNTERS

Not a word has been received from the hunters to date, although a rumor has been current that J. W. Anderson had succeeded in bagging a moose. The report has not been verified, however. It might be mentioned in passing, that some sixty licenses were issued by Mr. Bradshaw, Fishery and Game Overseer.

SAD DROWNING AT PORT HOPE

While there his hat blew off into the File Factory Pond, and he, with another man, went out in an old punt to recover it. The old punt sank under them and Wm. Albert Darling is a married man of about 40 years of age, with a wife and six children.

PROHIBITION WON IN MAINE STATE

Portland, Me., Nov. 7.—The following expression on the result of the constitutional prohibition elections in Maine, announced by the Governor and Council last night as 758 against repeal, was received by telegraph to-day from Mrs. L. M. N. Stevens, National President of the W.C.T.U., from the National headquarters in Evanston, Ill.: "Despatch regarding Maine prohibition brings rejoicing to a multitude of hearts and homes."

GERMAN ELECTIONS

The general elections for the German Reichstag, which, it is announced, are to be held in the week beginning January 12, will, by all accounts, probably show an unprecedented increase in the Socialist party's strength. The high cost of living in Germany is reported to be making Socialist votes at a tremendous rate. For two or three years past, moreover, the Socialists have been winning notable victories in by-elections.
