He must also occasionally read motions in French and he is loyally accepting the duties of his position.

ABOUT TAXATION

Farm and Dairy

On several occasions a bill has been brought before the Ontario Legislature having for its object the giving to municipalities the right to tax land values at a higher rate than improvements. This bill has hitherto been championed in the Legislature by Mr. Frupp, a Conservative member, but has always had to be withdrawn due to the unalterable hostility of Premier Whitney.

The Premier's attitude on land taxation is hard to understand. It is admitted by all who have given the question thought, that between land values and the value of improvements, there is an essential difference. The first represents the results of man's thrift and industry.

To tax land values is to tax a man for something that he did not create, but which he is using, and which others in the community would make use of if he did not. To tax improvements is to tax the results of man's industry and to discourage improvement.

GOVERNMENT BY COMMISSION

(Kingston Standard)

The government-by-commission idea practically admits that government by the people is a failure. Logically carried out this idea would necessarily involve the abolition of Parliamentary Government, as it now exists and a return to the principles of aristocracy or nearly that.

Have representative institutions in this country fallen so low in public estimation, have they been so dire a failure that we are willing to return to the ideas of Government as they existed in England under the Stuarts? Municipal government in the United States has not been a brilliant success but in Canada we have yet to learn that it has lamentably failed.

MILLIONAIRE LIBERALITY

It is hard to realize the wealth of Andrew Carnegie without making a calculation of the possibilities which a great fortune comprises. He has already given away \$230,000,000, not all at once, but all in a comparatively short period of years. His latest gift is \$25,000,000 to the Carnegie corporation of New York to promote the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding among the people of the United States. The annual interest at 4 per cent on the amount that he has given away would be \$9,200,000, and the rapidity with which a large fortune increases is simply marvellous. A single millionaire, with money invested at four per cent, has an annual income of \$40,000 and generally his investments will average more than that. The wealth of Carnegie and Rockefeller can only be imagined. Carnegie has spent a good deal of time with his benefactions since his retirement from active life, but he now feels the need of assistance, as his years increase, and he will turn over the charitable work to the new Corporation. Carnegie has done a great deal of good, as he has been amply able to do. We note comparisons between his benefactions and those of Rockefeller in the New York press, and they are greatly in favor of Carnegie, both in the amount of money given away and the object of his charities. But comparisons are odious—both have been generous, and the money they have bestowed so liberally has helped to make the world better. It is a question whether the Liberal hand of the owner of an immense fortune fully offsets the wrong he may have done during the years of accumulation to those whose lives might have been made happier. This question is beyond human settlement, but it is seldom out of human consciousness.

NO HATPINS FOR QUEEN MARY

King George and Queen Mary are on their way to India to be crowned Emperor and Empress of that great dependency of the British Empire.

Queen Mary has discarded hat pins, and fastens her headgear with the old fashioned rubber band. What she does, the ladies of her court are bound to do, and the hat pin is banished from the best society of England. This announcement is important. Will it mark the beginning of the end of the dangerous daggers with which the women of the period have armed themselves, and of which the men of to-day stand in wholesome fear? There would be no question about it if the women of Paris had commenced the fashion of fastening their hats with elastic bands, but whether Queen Mary can set the fashion is another matter. One thing is certain, the Queen of England is a determined woman, and whether other women discard hat pins or not, she will have no more of them.

HOME RULE PROBLEM

Hon. Augustine Birrell has announced that the British Government's bill to provide Home Rule for Ireland will be introduced in March. The scheme involves the setting up in Ireland of a Parliament consisting of two Chambers, with an executive—that is, a Cabinet of Ministers—responsible to it.

sponsible to it. It involves that this Irish Parliament shall have full representative powers and control over purely Irish concerns. In considering what those concerns are the British Government will, Mr. Birrell says, be found taking a wide view, the object being to admit a national demand for national responsibility.

"Never in the history of the world" he said, "had the experiment of self-government failed. Why should it fail in the case of Ireland? Instead of Ireland being a blot upon our escutcheon, she would in time be a real integral part of a United Kingdom" he concluded.

LIQUOR LICENSE QUESTION

(Ottawa Free Press.)

In its zeal for the Tory party, the Ottawa Journal hastened to congratulate the Whitney Government on its decision, according to the announcement in Toronto Conservative newspapers to take the liquor license system out of politics altogether and place it in the hands of a non-partisan commission. The Journal regarded it as further evidence of the ability of the Whitney Government to give a "square and efficient" administration to the Province. It declared:

"And if local commissioners are to continue, the only way to get the matter cut of the party rut is to have the appointments of local commissioners made by a permanent central board not as amenable to party advice as any government of the day is sure to be."

And now it turns out that it was all a mistake. Sir James Whitney has no intention of taking the liquor license question out of politics, and he repudiates the Toronto Tory papers which announced his intention to appoint a commission on the Cay.

The Toronto Star tells the story: that the new Liberal platform appeared having that as one of its planks. "In view of this plank in the Liberal platform, the Mail and Empire and the News hastened the other day to claim it as a Whitney plank. The license system was about to be placed under a non-partisan commission by Mr. Hannai they said. 'Is that so?' exclaimed the Premier next day. 'We are not going to do anything of the kind.' 'Certainly not,' said the News, as soothingly as it could, in the haste of the moment. And then it continued, not in these words, but in words to this effect: 'Yesterday we endorsed the idea heartily in the belief that you were going to do it, but we didn't believe in it then, and do not now. Certainly not, Sir James. We are not opposed to it, unless you are going to do it.'"

The license administration policy of the Whitney government, says the Peterboro Examiner, is condemned even by its own political friends, and where the condemnation is not direct, as in the case of the Journal, quoted above, it is indirect in the form of the Mail and Empire and News, hailing with joy a commission to fairly administer the license law. When they change front on finding that Sir James Whitney has no intention of taking license administration out of politics, they are acting the part of duplicitous party journals, but that does not weaken the force of their implied condemnation of the partizan administration of the license law.

CANADIAN PEAT BOGS

The known peat bogs of Canada are estimated to cover an area of approximately 36,000 square miles, from which about 28,000,000,000 tons of air-dried peat could be produced. This is said to be equal in fuel value to some 14,000,000,000 tons of coal. To encourage the utilization of these resources, a peat bog of 300 acres with an average depth of 8-feet has been acquired by the Canadian Government, at Alfred, near Caledonia Springs, Prescott County, Ontario. About five miles of ditches have been dug, and a storage shed, blacksmith shop and office have been built. It is estimated that the erection of a plant capable of producing 30 tons of air-dried peat daily should not cost very much, and since workable peat bogs are scattered throughout the farming regions of Ontario and Quebec, the most economical for utilizing this fuel would be the

erection of a number of plants at convenient points, to be operated in the interests of the neighboring communities.—Canadian Engineer.

LIBERALS OWE WHITNEY NOTHING

Many Liberals, remarks the Peterboro Examiner, at the last two general elections, were led by some vague influence, or reasoning, to support the Whitney government. It would be more to the point to say that they were misled for the result has not justified their misplaced confidence in the rather braggart claims of the Whitney government. Sir James, last election, pretended to be grateful to Liberal votes, and he showed this by applying the axe and lopping off Liberal heads wherever they showed. He trained his spoils system guns even on the Justice of the Peace and hardly left on the Commission a baker's dozen of the Liberals, for whose support he gave hypocritical thanks. This is a small matter; he has done worse than applying the axe to Liberal officials: he has showed stagnant disregard for progressive Liberal principles.

The lack of claims of Sir James Whitney on Liberals is further shown by the Toronto Star, which remarks that the official Conservative view is that the Liberals are decent, and humble fellows, whose function is to obey and support two Conservative governments.

As a matter of fact, Liberals owe not a little of support to the present Whitney Government, nor is that government likely to get any such support.

Liberalism is not prone to support the autocracy of Sir James Whitney, because Liberalism, when not representative of the people's rights and wishes, is not Liberalism at all.

The Premier of Ontario for the first time in the history of the province, officially launched a provincial government into the arena of Dominion politics, and it was not patriotism, nor broad-mindedness which brought the Ontario government forces into that fight, but pure partizanship.

Liberalism, when not progressive is not Liberalism at all, and the Liberals of Ontario can find very little, if any, of the truly progressive element in the present Whitney government, which they can conscientiously support.

Liberalism is not Liberalism at all, which condones a neglect of almost every department of provincial importance, such as agriculture, colonization, public school, technical education, and labor legislation. Liberals who have witnessed wonderful strides of expansion in the broad Dominion during the last fifteen years of Liberal rule, brought about by legislation which was truly Liberal and truly progressive, cannot and will not support a provincial government, the one object of which is to entrench itself in power and continue its autocracy.

POPULAR MAJORITY FOR TORIES

Ottawa, Nov. 20.—The Conservative majority in the Dominion, excluding the Yukon, in the recent general election, is officially figured out as 43383. The figures are official in every case save Winnipeg and Red Deer, where the statement of the members elect has been taken as the basis. The comparison by Provinces is as follows:

Thus the majority for the Conservatives in the Province of Ontario alone provided 65,904, and outside of Ontario the Government is in a minority.
