CONDITIONS GROWING WORSE

The Toronto News is in a position to show the conditions under which the present Government administers the affairs of this Province, and I think its statement at its full face value, that there could be no clearer statement that the enforcement of the law is held to be secondary to the interests of the Conservative party and that the spoils... exercise a controlling influence over Mr. Whitney and his associates.

FARMERS' BANK DEPOSITORS TO ASK GOVERNMENT FOR MEASURE OF RELIEF

Mr. I. E. Weldon, representing the defunct Farmers Bank depositors was in Ottawa last Thursday, and in company with Mr. C. J. Thoratton, M.P., for West Durham, interviewed the Minister of Finance as well as a great many members regarding some measure of relief for the depositors. Another interview will be granted the representatives by the Minister of Finance on Friday morning, Nov. 24th, at 9.30 o'clock.

Mr. Thornton got busy among all the members of Parliament interested in the matter and succeeded in getting a letter from each asking for an appointment with Mr. Borden and his Ministers. This has been agreed to, and the representatives of the depositors will meet the Government on Friday, Nov. 24th at 12 o'clock noon.

JUDGMENT OF MAGISTRATE MOORE RE SCUGOG LAKE DUCK SHOOTING CASE

The decision, re the duck shooting case heard before Magistrate Moore last week was given to-day. Messrs. J. Carnegie and Charlie Bowerman of Port Perry, and Mrs. H. Hodgson, of Toronto, were charged with placing decoys for duck shooting more than two hundred yards from the shore, or a natural rice bed. The information was laid by Game and Fishery Inspector Parkin.

The Magistrate, in giving his decision, said that the decoys were undoubtedly placed more than 200 yards from the shore, but that they were only 30 yards from the bed of rushes and rice. No mention was made as to whether the bed of rushes and rice would conceal a boat, so the Magistrate took it for granted that it would conceal a boat. The clause under which the prosecution was being made, reads "natural bed of rushes." Magistrate Moore said that the word "natural" changed the meaning of the clause altogether. To his mind, the word, "natural," meant any place where rushes or such plants were likely to be found growing, therefore, as the decoys in question were within 30 yards of such a place where rushes and rice were growing, the Magistrate dismissed the case, the only costs levied being the costs of the enlargement, which amounted to \$3.60.

GIGANTIC SCHEME FOR CHEAP POWER PROGRAMME OF THE HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Toronto Mail:—For the purpose of reporting to the Hydro-Electric Commission as to the cost of carrying the Hydro-Electric system to the extreme western, eastern and northern sections of the province, officials of the Commission started out yesterday to investigate the power possibilities in Huron, Grey, Bruce and the Trent Canal districts. On New Year's Day 28 municipalities will vote on the question as to whether they will enter into agreements with the Commission for a supply of cheap power.

Power will be developed on the Maitland and Sauguen Rivers, and at least 15,000 horse-power will be available. As these rivers are practically dry during hot summer months, the system will be augmented by a loop, attached to the Niagara system, so that power will be available at all times of the year. New transformer stations will be erected at Guelph and Seaford in order to augment the supply from the Maitland and Sauguen Rivers. If the western lines are built, one will run from Seaford to Goderich, Clinton, Bayfield, Hensall, Exeter, Zurich, Dashwood, Crediton, Leith, Brussels, Wingham and Belgrave. The other will run from Guelph to Elora, Fergus, Arthur, Mount Forest, Harris, Palmerston, Listowel, Durham, Shallow Lake, Owen Sound, Meaford, Thornbury, Warton and Collingwood. From these two trunk lines, branch lines will run to every town and village in the district, so that every farmer in the community will be in a position to have cheap power delivered at cost.

In the Trent Canal district all towns from Whitby to Cornwall will be served. More than 4,000 horse power will be developed on the Trent Canal and on the Ottawa River at Chat's Falls, there is a possible development of 100,000 horse power.

When this gigantic scheme is completed \$5,000,000 will be necessary for equipment, and there will not be one city, town, or village in the order part of the province which will not be served by the Whitney-Beck cheap power scheme.

LINDSAY BOY IS FORGING AHEAD PROMINENT SURVEYOR IN NORTHLAND

The following from the Toronto Sunday World will be read with interest by Lindsay people. Mr. H. T. Routley, Halleybury, is an old Lindsay boy who is "making good" in the north country, having attended the L.C.I. here. He can now qualify as an Ontario Land Surveyor and a Dominion Land Surveyor.

"About the best 'good roads' in Ontario are in the Township of Coleman, in New Ontario, in the Cobalt silver district. These roads have been built with great care, and what is more they are always kept in good condition. This is rather different from the usual procedure, for after roads are built they are usually allowed to take care of themselves.

"Winding in and out around the lakes in the Cobalt district, and planned so that all the mines are well cared for, thirty miles of road have been constructed right in the camp. Already \$150,000 has been expended on these roads, but they are models of excellence. The difficulties that had to be overcome are innumerable. The roads had to be built across muskeg, across lakes, and in many places hills of rock had to be cut away.

HORN BROS. ARE MAKING EXTENSIONS NEW BOILER HOUSE BEING BUILT

William Bros. have started a staff of men at work on an important addition to Horn Bros. Woollen mills. The boiler house is being considerably enlarged by the addition of a brick structure 48x18. The firm is installing a 150 horse power boiler and a 100 horse power Corliss engine. The Post has been informed that the firm is getting ready for further extensions to their already large factory. This is rendered necessary owing to the growth of the Company's business. The output of Horn Bros. mills is known from one end of the Dominion to the other, and the industry occupies a premier position among others of its kind in the country.

A large staff is at present employed and the mills are running day and night in order to keep up with the orders. One has only to pass the mills at night and see them lighted up with electricity and hear the hum of the machinery in order to realize their importance to the town.
